Foraker Forces Angered by Loss of Chairman.

FREE-FOR-ALL FIGHT ISSUES

Ohio Politicians Only Subside When the Police Arrive.

TWO CONVENTIONS ARE HELD

Both Make the Same Nomination for Congressman, but Elect Own Delegates to the National Convention.

CLEVELAND, O., March 19.—Wild scenes of disorder marked the opening of the 32nd Congressional Convention here today as a result of a fight between the Dick and "Filipino" (Foraker) factions.

The trouble started when the Dick men nominated Charles Leach as chairman, the "Filipinos" having already selected J. C. Ward, of Lake County, as the presiding officer.

The local adherents of Senator Foraker are known as "Filipinos." The former Hanna followers are now termed "Dick" men, being under the leadership of Senator Dick. The delegates were unstructured.

ONCE NOTED MAN IS DEAD

Ex-Leader of Prussian Reichstag Fell and Served Term in Prison.

NEW YORK, March 19.—Baron Wilhelm von Hammerstein is dead at the age of 66 years, says a Berlin dispatch to the Staats Zeitung. While editor of the Kreuz Zeitung, the foremost conservative paper of Prussia, and member of the Reichstag, he dominated the Conservative party as dictator until he was, in 1896, publicly accused of a number of crimes.

WILL TEST FEDERAL STATUTE

Whitecaps Contend Negroes Have Protection Not Given Whites.

HELENA, Ark., March 19.—Federal Judge Jacob Treiber today passed a preliminary sentence upon three whitecaps, convicted of conspiracy to intimidate negro workmen at a sawmill in Poinsett County. The defendant's attorney took appeal to the Supreme Court of the United States proposing to test the constitutionality of the Federal statute enacting into law the 14th amendment to the Constitution, holding that under this statute the negro citizens are granted a protection by the Federal Courts that is not given to white men.

SHERIFF LIABLE FOR DAMAGES

Government Can Collect \$5000 From Man Who Let Trainrobber Escape.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., March 19.—Judge C. D. Clark in the Federal Court, held that damages may be obtained by the Government from Sheriff Fox, of Knox County, in the amount of \$5000 for the escape of Harvey Logan, the Montana trainrobber, who was in his keeping and under sentence of 10 years for passing counterfeit currency secured by him in a train robbery. The bill of indictment of Attorney-General Wright made Fox liable for \$25,000.

SULLY HOPES TO RISE

Great Cotton King Says His Suspension is Temporary.

HE MAKES AN ASSIGNMENT

Creditors Will Meet Tomorrow and Decide on a Man to Take Charge Permanently—One Other Failure.

NEW YORK, March 19.—The excitement in Wall street that was caused by the announcement yesterday of the suspension of Daniel J. Sully & Co. was noticeable today, but gradually subsided during the market hours, and at the close of the cotton and stock markets, it was generally agreed that the worst of the failure was over.

After a conference between Mr. Sully and his lawyers this morning, the firm made a formal assignment to Joseph H. Hoadley, who at once took charge. This action was taken because it was learned an attachment was about to issue, and it was thought best to apply for an assignee for the protection of all creditors alike.

The following letter was sent by D. J. Sully & Co. to Robert P. McDougall, president of the New York Cotton Exchange: Upon his arrival at his office Mr. Sully conferred with his attorneys and received notice of an injunction against the Cotton Exchange Bank restraining that institution from paying over certain moneys.

Prices Drop at New Orleans. NEW ORLEANS, March 19.—The cotton market opened excited, prices ranging from 5 points down to 20 points below yesterday's close.

The amount is far less than that, I am glad to say, and after a careful compilation it was the opinion of all present at the meeting that a safe estimate of his holdings would be about 25,000 bales."

LIVERPOOL MARKET IS GOOD

Effect of Sully Expansion Not as Great as Expected.

LIVERPOOL, March 19.—The cotton market here this morning presented a lively appearance in view of the Sully expansion. The market was not announced until after this market had closed. The galleries and balcony of the exchange were filled with onlookers, and the brokers were waiting until the opening bell rang. They then gave vent to the pent-up excitement which existed before the opening.

The effect of the Sully expansion was not so great as expected. Although there was great excitement during the first few minutes, there was absolutely no panic buying orders were plentiful. Spinners no doubt would have liked the market to drop further, but the feeling generally is that the Lancashire trade will probably be healthy until the excitement passes away. The low point was reached in the first 15 minutes of trading. The excitement continued, but supporting orders in the active months—June, July, August, October and November—were executed and a rally of about 10 points followed.
