Parker Enthusiasm Takes a Big Slump.

STILL HE IS IN THE LEAD

Uninstructed Delegates Appear to Be in Favor.

MANY STATES YET TO ACT

Of Those Which Have Held Conventions, the Number to Give No Instructions Have as Many Votes as Those With Favorites.

CHICAGO, April 30.—(Special)—In Democratic circles, Hearst and Parker are still commanding the attention of the public. While last week the Parker fever seemed about to sweep the country, the enthusiasm appears to have abated, and the list of uninstructed delegates grows apace.

The Massachusetts fight gave Mr. Olney 24 and Mr. Hearst six, with two in doubt. George Fred. Williams and other Hearst delegates have declared they will not abide by the unit rule adopted by the State Convention, so the delegation will remain undivided unless the National Convention insists that the delegates must abide by their instructions.

New Hampshire was the only state that elected a complete delegation during the week. Its eight delegates are uninstructed. The result to date is as follows:

ANTI-TAMMANY MAN NAMED.

Senator McGarren Heads Executive Committee New York Democracy. NEW YORK, April 30.—At a meeting of the Democratic state committee here today, Cord Meyer, of Queensborough, N. Y., was elected chairman, to succeed Frank Campbell, and State Senator McGarren, of Brooklyn, was made chairman of the executive committee.

E. L. Winter, of New York, was chosen Presidential elector in place of Robert B. Roosevelt, who declined to serve owing to the fact that President Roosevelt is his nephew. Prior to the meeting of the committee it was reported that while the Tammany men would not object to the selection of Senator McGarren as chairman of the executive committee, they also suggested that Charles F. Murphy, president of Tammany Hall, would be placed on the executive committee, but Thomas F. Smith, of New York, held Mr. Murphy's proxy, and said he did not believe Mr. Murphy would consent to serve upon a committee headed by Mr. McGarren.

BELIEVES PARKER WILL WIN.

John Sharp Williams Says He Is Not in the Race. WASHINGTON, April 30.—Representative John Sharp Williams, of Mississippi, in an authorized statement, says he believes the nomination of Judge Parker is assured.

"It is clear to me now," said Williams, "that Mr. Parker will be nominated by such an overwhelming vote that there will be substantially no opposition when the time for the convention arrives. Individually, I favor his selection."

Williams, when questioned concerning the report that he is a candidate for the Presidential nomination, said: "I think you know me well enough to know that I have never been idiot enough to take this talk seriously. There has been some talk of the nomination of a Southern man. I do not think such a course would be wise just now. That time will come, and it will not be very distant, as history comes time. When it does come, the South will be able to find 10,000 men abler and 100,000 better men than I am."

DENIES HE WAS DESPERADO.

Taylor, at Tacoma, Says He Never Operated With Missouri Gang. TACOMA, April 30.—Bob Taylor, who killed W. W. Barnes Thursday and wounded Sheriff Denholm yesterday, denies being a member of the Taylor gang of desperados, one of whom escaped from the Linn County (Missouri) jail in 1888. His story is fully corroborated by Jaller Lincoln, who is now guarding the prisoner in Tacoma. Lincoln was jailer at St. Joseph, Mo., when George Taylor escaped, and says the prisoner bears no resemblance whatever to the Missouri desperado.

The account in Taylor's diary, found in his hut, of having killed two men, one

may, refers to Barnes and his companion, whom he shot near St. Joseph, Mo., a bird shot near Jamestown, N. D., but says it was an accident, and that the man was only slightly injured. Taylor says he was at one time cowboy in Montana, but never having been a sheepherder, and says that until the present time he had not committed any crime. It is believed by the officials here that Taylor is a degenerate.

HOLDS HIM DRUNK WITH POWER

Attorney for Moyer Assails Governor Peabody in a Brief.

DENVER, April 30.—Governor James H. Peabody is declared to be a usurper in a brief filed before the Supreme Court today by Attorney E. F. Richardson in the habeas corpus case of Charles H. Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, who is held as a military prisoner at Telluride.

Governor Peabody is compared by Mr. Richardson to a soldier drunk with power, and his acts in trying to suspend the privilege of the writ of habeas corpus to the acts of tyranny practiced on the people of England by the old King. Mr. Richardson, in his brief, attacks the decision of the Supreme Court of Idaho in a similar case, and says it is the only court in the country that has said that the military was above the judiciary. He says that the decision does not follow practical common sense and that the Supreme Court of Idaho should not consider it when deciding the present case.

BEATEN ALMOST TO DEATH.

Organizer for United Mineworkers in Colorado Assaulted.

DENVER, April 30.—W. M. Wardlaw, National organizer of the United Mineworkers of America, was beaten over the head with revolvers by three unknown men at Sargent, Colorado, and lies in a critical condition today at the Denver & Rio Grande railroad hospital at Salida. Mr. Wardlaw was traveling Eastward from Crested Butte, where he had been organizing the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company miners, and was attacked in a bar while the train was standing at Sargent. He is suffering from concussion of the brain, and the hospital physicians say his recovery is doubtful.

Mr. Wardlaw was able to talk tonight. He declares his assailants were a detective of the Reno Agency named Gregory and two men by the names of Wolf and Walter. He says he is positive of the two latter. He says that during the struggle he secured a revolver and his assailants then ran. He chased them to the door and fired three shots at them. They replied with three shots, none of which took effect. He believes he wounded one of the men, as he says he saw him limp as he ran to the carriage in which the men escaped. The doctor at the hospital says that Wardlaw will probably recover, although he is suffering from severe concussion of the brain.

Discuss Colorado Situation.

INDIANAPOLIS, April 30.—The Colorado situation was again taken up at today's session of the National executive board of the United Mineworkers of America. Officers announced this afternoon that nothing had been done that may be made public. The vice-president received word that a strike of 800 coal-miners in the eastern part of the fifth Ohio subdivision will occur next Monday as the result of a fruitless conference between operators and miners extending over the last ten days. President Mitchell has telegraphed to "Mother" Jones, who is being held in quarantine near Price, Utah, directing her to report to him in person in this city as soon as possible. He says that there is no imminent danger to the life, and that the order was issued because the work in district 15 at the present time is scarcely suitable for a woman.

The national board of the United Mineworkers of America adjourned tonight to meet tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock. The men refuse to say what progress they are making toward settling the dispute of the troubles in district 15. It is believed a decision will be reached tomorrow.

choir of 500 voices led by Alfred Ernst. President Francis then introduced Mayor R. H. Wells, of St. Louis, who spoke briefly, extending to the people of the country a cordial welcome to the St. Louis Exposition.

Ellen Thomas H. Carter, president of the National Commission, then spoke on behalf of the body of which he is the head. At the conclusion of Mr. Carter's address, President Francis introduced a member of the Senate. This was Senator Burnham, of New Hampshire, who made an address.

Following Mr. Burnham came James A. Tawney, of Minnesota, who spoke for the National House of Representatives. He congratulated "Those who conserved and

accomplished this marvelous result as a means of celebrating the anniversary of the purchase of the territory of Louisiana, and their magnificent success in the domestic exhibitors Edward H. Harriman, president of the New York Commission, delivered an address.

Taft Speaks for Nation.

The chorus of "America" was then sung and the Hon. William H. Taft, as the representative of the President of the United States, delivered the last address of the day. The conclusion of the speech of Secretary Taft was the signal for the opening of the fair. In the White House at Washington, President Roosevelt was waiting for the signal which was to tell him that the proper moment had arrived to touch the golden key that would open the fair in earnest and set its manifold machinery in full operation.

Machinery is Started.

Secretary Taft had not turned to resume his seat after concluding his speech before the signal had been flashed to Washington over the wires of the Postal Telegraph Company. Instantly there was a returning flash which started the machinery in machinery hall in operation. Strictly speaking, this was all that was accomplished by the Presidential touch on the button at Washington. Operators were waiting for the signal from the White House, and as quickly as it came they touched. As it came they touched the keys which released the fastenings and unfurled banners that were secured to the staffs on the roofs of all the large exhibition palaces. This portion of the work, as far as could be seen from any one section of the grounds, was perfect. Every banner apparently caught the same breath of air and unfurled and floated out as one.

At the entrance of the lagoon the Louisiana monument was the place for the cascades. The following reply was received from President Roosevelt: "Hon. David R. Francis, St. Louis: I congratulate you and your associates on this memorable occasion. I wish well to all for the success of the great enterprise, and on behalf of the American people I greet the representatives of foreign countries who have come here to cooperate with us in celebrating in an appropriate fashion the 100th anniversary of the event which has turned us into a continental Nation."

NEW YORK, April 30.—The naval regatta of New Jersey was under way at the St. Louis Exposition, having decided to send an ensign with a crew of 12 men and a cook. It is proposed to go overland to Pittsburgh, down the Ohio River to the mouth of the Mississippi at St. Louis. On the return trip the crew will row down the Mississippi River to New Orleans and return from there by steamship. A double-ender tug will be used on the river trip and the crew will camp en route.

CHICAGO NEEDS FIREMEN.

Underwriter Reports Its Department as Inadequate.

CHICAGO, April 30.—William H. Johnson, inspector for the National Board of Underwriters, who has just concluded a six weeks' investigation of the Chicago fire department and other auxiliaries affecting the fire insurance of the city, has made his report. Among other things, he finds: "That the present fire-fighting force is inadequate to meet the needs of the city, and that the department, as a whole, on the down grade. That the downtown, or congested district, is in danger of a serious conflagration. That the merchants and owners of buildings are careless and neglect to avail themselves of the various precautionary devices with which their buildings are equipped. That the present water facilities are insufficient. That many of the engine houses are unfit to the uses that they are put. That physically incapacitated men are on the force."

In sending out this report, the fire department committee of the National Board of Firewriters suggests: That the members of the fire department be selected to secure the improvements recommended.

WHITNEY MANSION IS SOLD.

Price, \$2,500,000, is Highest Ever Paid in New York.

NEW YORK, April 30.—Although William C. Whitney's will provided that his magnificent house at 1515 Fifth avenue "shall be maintained as a home" for his daughter, Dorothy, and his stepchildren for two years after his death, it is reported to have been sold to James Henry Smith, heir of the \$30,000,000 estate of George Smith, of Chicago and London. None of those directly interested has confirmed the report. The price paid is \$2,500,000 for the home, together with many rare paintings and objects of art, with the exception of a single painting, a Van Dyke, for which the sale has been at the figure indicated. It will go on record as the highest paid for a private residence in New York. The building is a four-story structure on the northeast corner of the avenue and Sixty-eighth street, with a Fifth avenue frontage of 55 feet and 200 feet on the south streets.

TELLS RUSSIA TO COME OUT.

Correspondent Says the World Does Not Understand Her.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 30.—Prince Outomsky, who has gone to St. Louis to attend the peace congress, writing to his paper, the Vidomost, says he regrets that so few Russian newspapermen have accepted the invitation to attend the congress. "Our silence and our absence," writes the Prince, "only increases the score against us. It is time that we came out and told our beliefs, our ideals and our aims. This would insure the respect of the world which at present wonders at our silence. The German and Russian understand us, the Latin think us cunning and the English scientific, while the Americans understand us little."

ROOSEVELT TOUCHES THE KEY

Noted Assemblage in the East Room of the White House at the Time.

WASHINGTON, April 30.—President Roosevelt today pressed the golden key which completed the electrical circuit and released the gigantic power of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition at St. Louis, putting in motion the 40,000 horsepower machinery and the fair-like cascades on the exposition ground. The ceremony occurred in the East Room of the White House precisely at 1 o'clock, Eastern standard time. As the President pressed the key the Third Battery of United States Artillery, stationed on the grounds of the Washington Monument, south of the White House, fired a National salute of 21 guns. Congratulatory messages were then exchanged between the President and David R. Francis, president of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition Company.

The historic ceremony was witnessed by a notable assemblage. Among the guests were the President, the Vice-President, the members of the Cabinet, except Secretary Taft, who is in St. Louis, as the personal representative of the President; the Chief Justice and the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court of the United States; Senator Frye, Speaker Cannon, Ambassadors, Ministers and other representatives of foreign governments at this capital, the Missouri delegation from the Senate and the House of Representatives, and prominent people in the various walks of life.

The Marine Band was stationed in the vestibule of the White House and rendered a suitable programme immediately preceding and subsequent to the ceremony in the East Room. The handsome mahogany table which supported the telegraph instruments was located in the south end of the East Room, and on it was a small table covered with blue and gold cloth, to the top of which was attached the gold key which the President closed the circuit. The same table and the same key have been used on several similar historic occasions. In 1893 President Cleveland used the key in starting the machinery of the Chicago Fair, and in 1888 it was used to start the American Electrical Institute. The key was made in the possession of General Greely, president-general of the Sons of the American Revolution.

Messages of Roosevelt and Francis.

ST. LOUIS, April 30.—The following message was sent by President Roosevelt to the exposition, to President Roosevelt: "To the President of the United States: In response to the signal dashed by the President of the United States, the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, which opened the grounds, the sky is cloudless. The people assembled all the great palaces. The grounds and buildings are complete. The event which has turned us into a continental Nation. In behalf of the exposition, I wish to express to the Chief Executive of the Nation our most sincere thanks for the honor done in formally opening the exposition."

The following reply was received from President Roosevelt: "Hon. David R. Francis, St. Louis: I congratulate you and your associates on this memorable occasion. I wish well to all for the success of the great enterprise, and on behalf of the American people I greet the representatives of foreign countries who have come here to cooperate with us in celebrating in an appropriate fashion the 100th anniversary of the event which has turned us into a continental Nation."
