NEW CORPORATIONS FORMED.—Articles of incorporation of the Hudson Lumber & Logging Company were filed in the County Clerk's office yesterday; capital stock, \$20,000. The incorporators are Andrew Smith, L. F. Hudson and W. E. Plasted. The objects announced are to do a general logging business, conduct a sawmill and construct a logging road from a point in section 11, township 2 north, range 2 west, to a point on the Willamette Slough, a distance of about two miles. Myron D. Stone, J. O. Hort and C. A. Bell filed articles of incorporation yesterday of the Portland Stone & Supply Company; capital stock, \$10,000. The objects are to do general contracting, make contracts for buildings, etc.
