The Methodists Vote on Bishopric Eligibility.

CONGREGATIONS TO DECIDE

Amendment for Election of Colored Men to Be Submitted.

HERESY QUESTION PASSED ON

It Proves a Small Thing, and Colleges Are All Exonerated—Conference Will Finally Adjourn Today.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 28.—Almost on the stroke of midnight tonight the General Methodist Conference of 1904 concluded its last business session with the reading of the roll for the last time, and adjourned until 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, when a memorial service will be held and final adjournment taken.

The closing hours of the conference witnessed a perfect deluge of committee reports and resolutions. After the matter of an amendment to the constitution of the church, so as to provide for the election of bishops other than that of the white race, of several congregations as approved at the annual and lay conference, the press of other important business was so great that all of the business before the conference was finally placed in the hands of a sifting committee at 10:15 P. M., with orders to report in 15 minutes. Among the important subjects presented by this committee to the conference, and passed in the closing moments, were the following:

Matter of providing relief for superannuated preachers, temperance, use of the Bible in the public schools, the petitioning of Congress on the subject of polygamy, and the practices of Mormonism, and complimentary resolutions.

A telegram was read during the evening from Secretary of the Treasury Shaw, congratulating the conference on the work performed during the past month. By common consent a fraternal reply was sent to Mr. Shaw.

Report for Colored Bishop.

Bishop J. M. Buckley, in presenting the report of the committee on Episcopacy on the election of others than whites as bishops, characterized the recommendation as one of the most far-reaching importance. It was an action, he said, as weighty as any that had been taken by any general conference of recent years. Following was the report of the committee:

"Concerning memorials from the Tennessee, East Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, Mississippi, Texas and Lexington Conferences, requesting the General Conference to provide for the election of bishops of African descent, who shall be assigned to the presidency of conferences, consisting wholly or chiefly of ministers of African descent, we respectfully report:

"That in the present state of our fundamental law, a constitutional objection is raised to the granting of the request of memorialists; but there having been referred to this committee, by the General Conference, a memorial from the Rock River Conference to change the fundamental law so as to make possible the realization of the desires of the memorialists and to accomplish other important objects, therefore,

"Resolved, First, that this General Conference propose the following amendment to the constitution of the church, to be submitted to the constituent churches at their third restrictive rule paragraph 6, section 3, of the discipline of 1900, so that the whole paragraph shall read: 'The General Conference shall not change or alter any part or rule of the government of the church to do away with the episcopacy, nor destroy the plan of our itinerant general superintendency; but may elect a bishop or bishops for work among particular races and languages, and for other foreign missions, limiting their episcopal jurisdiction to the same respectively.'

"Resolved, Second, that if this report is adopted thereafter the above proposed amendment to the constitution be submitted to the General Conference in order to ascertain whether the legal constitutional vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting shall be given, and

"Resolved, Third, if such should be the result the bishops shall be requested to submit the proposition to the members at the annual conferences and at the lay electoral conferences, which shall meet in the years 1907 and 1908 for their adoption of the same amendment to the constitution."

The conference also adopted the majority report of the committee on education on the subject of opening the American University at Washington. The report advised that the university be not opened until the endowment of \$500,000 had been raised, but recommended that the matter be left in the hands of the university trustees for decision.

Heresy Question No Large One.

The heresy question, which has been held up by many as a thing upon which there would be prolonged and heated debate, proved to be a very small matter after all. It was dismissed with a report brought in by the committee on education, the conference adopting its recommendations without a ripple of excitement. There was no debate except a brief speech by Dr. Munhall, who is credited with being the leader of the forces opposed to the so-called higher criticism in the theological colleges. Dr. Munhall merely stated his opposition to Bible criticism, and declared himself favorable to the report as presented.

The recommendations of the committee on education on this particular point were that in the absence of sufficient proof against the faculty of certain universities, these institutions be exonerated on all the charges of heresy. The report recommended also that since there is some unrest and a disposition to fear that heresy will develop, the directors should exercise care in the selection of instructors, appointing none concerning whose soundness of doctrine there is any question. Professors were cautioned to instruct their students to preach none but established doctrines. The report was passed by a large vote.

New Bishops Preside.

The report of the missions committee was adopted, with the following recommendations: Favoring the revision by a commission of the ritual pertaining to marriage ceremony and administration of the sacrament in the Southern Asia district; favor-

ing the granting of a subsidy to the Mexican Christian Advocate; referring to a commission the unification of Methodist bodies in Japan, with power to act; favoring the erection, as soon as practicable, of a union theological school for all Methodist missionaries in Europe; advising that a special column be provided in annual conference minutes for the recording of special mission gifts, but providing that churches which have not come up to their regular missions appointments shall have no gifts recorded in said column.

The conference also passed a resolution expressing sympathy with the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers in the sudden death of First Assistant Grand Engineer Ingraham.

Several of the newly-elected bishops were given their first experience as presiding officers over the General Conference at today's session. Bishops Berry, Spellmeyer, Bashford and McDowell presided in turn. The others of the new bishops will preside during some of the sessions before final adjournment.

A special committee was appointed this morning to draft complimentary resolutions to the City of Los Angeles and all of the various local committees which have had to do with the arrangements for carrying on the conference during the past month.

A report from the itinerancy committee on the subject of annual conference dis-

tricts provoked a long and animated debate. It read as follows:

"In response to the petitions contained in certain memorials referred to us for consideration, your committee on Itinerancy respectfully recommends that section 3 of paragraph 13 after the discipline be amended by adding thereto the words 'but the annual conference shall have the right by two-thirds vote to determine their number,' so that the entire section shall read: 'To form districts according to his judgment, but the annual conference shall have the right by a two-thirds vote to determine their number.'

"It was finally defeated by a vote of 307 to 285.

"The motion to borrow the money from the book concern was finally amended so as to instruct the presiding elders of various conference districts that are in arrears to make good their deficiency in order that the book concern may be reimbursed."

BOLD ROBBERY IN STORE.

Clerks and Customers Have to Step Back While Register Is Robbed.

CHICAGO, May 28.—A bold robbery was committed tonight in less than a minute at the shoe store of Frazin & Oppenheim, 135 Madison street, one square from the City Hall and the Central Police Station. There were 14 customers in the store and six clerks were attending to their wants when four men entered the place in succession, each about five feet behind the man in front of him. One of the clerks started forward to meet the supposed customers, when three of the men drew revolvers, and ordered the clerks and customers to the rear of the store. While the people were hesitating to obey, the fourth man took all the cash from the register, \$385, and then the four robbers ran out into Madison street and disappeared.

The store is slightly below the street level, but while the robbery was in progress the store was open and people passing along Madison street had a plain view of the inside of the store.

ROOSEVELT WILL SPEAK.

President Will Go to Gettysburg on Memorial Day.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—President Roosevelt will participate in the exercises on Memorial day on the battlefield of Gettysburg. He will arrive at Gettysburg about 9 o'clock Monday morning, and will return to Washington the same day, arriving here at 4 P. M. Included in the President's party will be Mrs. Roosevelt, Miss Ethel Roosevelt, Secretary Loeb and Surgeon-General Rixey.

Upon arrival at Gettysburg the party will be taken for a drive about the battlefield. The memorial exercises will begin at 10:30 A. M., with a procession to the cemetery where the graves will be decorated in accordance with the custom of the day. A programme of music and addresses will follow. President Roosevelt will deliver the principal address. The President will leave Gettysburg for Washington at 4 P. M.

WANT SMOOT OUT

Presbyterians Decide to Memorialize the Senate.

ASSEMBLY COMES TO CLOSE

Opponents of Union With the Cumberland Presbytery Again Protest in Vain, and a General Consolidation is Now Expected.

BUFFALO, May 28.—The Presbyterian General Assembly brought one of the most memorable gatherings of this denomination held in recent years to a

close tonight. The sessions, it is be-

lieved, are the prelude of the union of all branches of the Presbyterian denomination in the United States. The question of union will now be submitted to the presbyteries, and upon approval by two-thirds, the plans of union will be consummated. The relations between the mother church and the Presbyterian Church South and the United Presbyterians also tend toward unity.

The committee on bills and overtures this morning reported a memorial to the United States Senate praying for the expulsion of Senator Reed Smoot and enactment of more stringent laws against polygamy.

John I. Platt, lay commissioner of Poughkeepsie, threw the assembly into a temporary uproar by opposing the report. He held it was a political question, which the assembly had no right to do with. The vote was taken, but only five commissioners opposed the adoption of the report.

An overture was adopted asking the State Legislature to pass a law for Sunday closing of the Lewis and Clark Exposition.

A recommendation objecting to the removal of the Liberty Bell from Philadelphia to St. Louis and its exhibition on Sunday was carried unanimously.

Drs. Moffat, Johnson and Coyle were appointed a committee to reply to a protest signed by Dr. John Fox, of New York, and six other members of the General Assembly against the action of the committee adopting the report on church membership.

The membership of the committee on church co-operation and union was increased from eight to 15. The new members are Moderator Henry, of Philadelphia; Dr. B. L. Patton, of Princeton; President Moffat, of Washington and Jefferson College; W. P. Nicholas, of Princeton; Professor John Dewitt, of Princeton; and H. C. Gars, of Philadelphia.

The report of the committee on judicial commissions provides for the establishment of a permanent tribunal which shall be a supreme court for the General Assembly to which the assembly may refer all cases involving church law.

The report of the temperance commission was on the programme today. It recommended total abstinence on the part of ministers and elders from the use of intoxicants, and the use of their influence on the members of the congregations to the same end, and recommended that ministers and those seeking the ministry be advised against the use of tobacco.

The assembly placed itself on record against the protest of a few commissioners to the action of the assembly on the question of union with the Cumberland Presbyterian Church by adopting the report of the committee appointed to reply to the protestants.

The committee on vacancy and supply recommended that a committee be appointed to inquire into conditions prevalent in the church, as to the candidates for the ministry and for methods which should be adopted to increase their number. The report was adopted.

A resolution in favor of the reading of the Bible in the public schools was adopted.

The following reports of committees were received and adopted: Narrative and necrology, church statistics, forward movement of church education, ministerial sustentation and synodical records.

The permanent committee was authorized, if it deemed wise, to memorialize Congress to insert in the enabling act for the admission of Oklahoma and Indian Territory to statehood a provision for the maintenance of the prohibition law of the Indian Territory.

1905 Fair Resolution Adopted.

BUFFALO, N. Y., May 28.—(Special Correspondence).—The General Presbyterian Association today adopted the following resolution by a standing vote: "We recommend that as the Lewis and Clark Exposition, to be held in the City of Portland, Or., in 1905, is to be both a National and International, the general assembly earnestly requests the Legislature of Oregon, which convenes next

Winter, to take action to keep the gates of the Exposition closed on the Lord's day."

STONE IS RE-ELECTED CHIEF.

Brotherhood of Engineers Gives Him an Overwhelming Vote.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 28.—Eventful were the proceedings at both sessions of the Locomotive Engineers' Convention today. The chair so tragically vacated Friday by First Grand Chief T. S. Ingraham was filled by William B. Prenter, Grand Engineer W. S. Stone was returned to office by almost unanimous vote, and the insurance branch was dependent on a cast vote, with President Patch, has since 1896 so administered the association interests as to place it along with fraternal organizations.

The change of office for Prenter means a serious loss to the insurance Association. This evening the board of trustees of the Brotherhood met to canvass the field for a suitable man to be given the insurance secretaryship.

The result of this canvass will be made public on Monday forenoon, when the convention will be asked to endorse the choice of the trustees.

First Chief Prenter became a member of the Brotherhood in 1879 in Toronto, Canada. He was elected to the insurance secretaryship in 1886.

The event of the afternoon's executive session was the election of Grand Chief Stone to succeed himself by a vote that was a surprise to even his most sanguine friends. But one ballot was necessary for a choice. Chief Stone received 430 votes, Matt Shay 107, and C. W. Gardner 41. The rest were scattered. When the result was made known, the convention went wild. A motion to make this first ballot formal was carried unanimously.

OPPOSED SHIP SUBSIDY.

Joseph Foard Tells Commission It is Impracticable.

BALTIMORE, May 28.—The Merchant Marine Commission, appointed by Congress, composed of members of that body, for the purpose of making recommendations for legislation in regard to the restoration of American shipping, met here today.

Joseph R. Foard opposed the general subsidy plan for encouraging the building of ships as being impracticable. He said he would recommend liberal mail contracts, amended navigation laws and a builders' or owners' bonus of 20 per cent in cash upon the commissioning of ships completed within two years of the passage of the act, and diminishing at the rate of 5 per cent a year down to nothing at the end of ten years.

Bernard N. Baker, president of the Atlantic Transport Company, spoke in behalf of a ship subsidy, maintaining that Congress should make an appropriation each year for a number of years for the rebuilding of American shipping. He further suggested that this should be made subject to a contract being entered into by public proposals so that no citizen or corporation should have any undue advantage. Under such a contract, the owners of these ships would not be allowed to transfer them to any foreign flag for a period of 20 years, and the ships would always be at the command of the Government for transport service.

He declared that "trade would follow the flag," and the subsidizing of the marine would enormously increase the export trade. Mr. Baker said he believed the amount to be set aside yearly by Congress should be \$10,000,000, and if this were done he believed that in ten years 2,500,000 tons would be added to American shipping.

ABOLISHES THE CONCORDAT.

Sweeping Measure Drawn by French Committee on Fight With Vatican.

PARIS, May 28.—Premier Combes' announcement that the question of separation of state and church would come in January has drawn attention to the law recently formulated by the committee on the separation of the church and state. It is a sweeping measure, the opening clauses reading as follows:

The republic assures freedom of conscience, it guarantees the free exercise of religion without restriction, except for the preservation of public order.

"The republic will neither protect nor pay salaries nor subsidies to any religious body, nor to any denomination. It will not recognize any minister of religion and will not furnish any building for the services of any denomination or for the lodging of any minister of religion."

The measure further abolishes the concordat, suppresses the French Embassy at the Vatican and makes detailed provision for the disposal of the government's extensive possession of church property.

Showed Stoicism of an Indian.

Quay showed all the stoicism of an Indian in his last illness. He held out no hope of recovery, and refused to believe it was possible. Coolly and firmly, he took leave of his dearest things. Thursday last, he asked to be taken to his famous library, remarking to his attendants:

"I want to see my books once more before I die."

Through it all his mental energies never flagged. He joked grimly at times, and was cheerful in his comments on Thursday night. The absent members of the family were summoned, and every preparation for the end made. Last night, his condition continued worse and the end gradually came, stupor, fever, high pulse and weakened respiration marking the approach of death.

GREAT EFFECT ON POLITICS.

Cameron and Frick Are Mentioned as Successors to Quay.

BEAVER, Pa., May 28.—Senator Penrose was asked this afternoon what effect the death of Senator Quay would have on politics. He said:

"I don't want to discuss it under the conditions. Undoubtedly there will be sweeping changes, but I cannot name these now."

"Senator Penrose raced across the State of Pennsylvania last night to see the Senator before he died, reaching here at 10 o'clock this morning."

William Montgomery, cashier of the Allegheny National Bank of Pittsburgh, a close business and social friend of Senator Quay, tonight estimated that Senator Quay's estate was worth about \$90,000, of which \$40,000 is absolutely secured to his widow.

It is rumored that conferences are to be held in Philadelphia tomorrow, at which a successor to Senator Quay may be decided upon, and Governor Penrose expected to call a special session of the Legislature.

Among those mentioned as possible successors to Senator Quay is W. W. Frick, with whom J. Donald Cameron spent the night after leaving Quay again. There is a very strong feeling in certain quarters that J. Donald Cameron will succeed Senator Quay and harmonize all the state factions.

Governor Issues Proclamation.

HARRISBURG, Pa., May 28.—Governor Pennypacker tonight issued a proclamation, announcing the death of Senator Quay, and ordering that the flags on the public buildings be displayed at half-mast, and that the several departments be closed upon the day of his funeral.

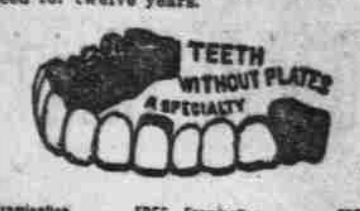
