

GAMES AT STADIUM

Rain Interferes Greatly But
Some Good Records Made.

MISS ROOSEVELT ATTENDS

She Presents Medals to Winners—
New York Irish Club Takes First
Honor—Plaw, of Oakland,
Does Well.

ST. LOUIS, June 4.—The junior and senior American Athletic Union championship games were held at the World's Fair Stadium today, under the most adverse circumstances. A heavy downpour of rain left deep pools of water on the field and track, and kept all spectators away from the junior events, which were held first. Fires were built on the field to dry places for the discus, shot-put and hammer-throwing contests, but a brigade of men with sponges and buckets stopped the pools from the track.

Despite these drawbacks, some good records were made, many of the previous junior American Athletic Union records being broken. Miss Alice Roosevelt occupied the President's box and presented the medals to the winners at the end of the game.

The meet was won by the New York Irish Athletic Association of New York, the representatives of which scored 61 points. The New York Athletic Club came next, with 42 points; Pacific Athletic Club, of San Francisco, 31 points; Chicago Athletic Club, eight points; Seventy-fourth Regiment Athletic Association, of Buffalo, and Maryland Athletic Club tied with five points each; Cambridgeport, Mass. Athletic Club, one point; Washington University, St. Louis, one point; Xavier Athletic Club, one point; Star Athletic Club, New York, one point.

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ONE FOR STANFORD

Dole Excels in Pole Vault at
Great Chicago Meet.

MORE EXPECTED OF TEAM

Michigan Athletes Score the Most
Points—Six Intercollegiate Confer-
ence Records Are Made, and Two
Old Ones Are Equalled.

CHICAGO, June 4.—The University of Michigan today won the Intercollegiate Athletic Association meet held on Marshall Field, securing 22 points. Chicago was second, with 17 points, and Wisconsin third with a total of 23.

Six new intercollegiate conference records were made, and two of the old marks were equalled. In the weight events "Giant" Rose, of Michigan, broke the conference record in the shot-put, establishing a new mark at 47 feet 1/4 inch and beating the old figure, held by Kirby, of Notre Dame, by nearly six feet. In the discus-throw Rose also set a new mark, hurling the weight a distance of 125 feet 1/4 inches, which is almost seven feet better than the record made by Swift, of Iowa.

The Leland Stanford team which had come from the Pacific Coast to enter the contest, failed to show up as well as expected, landing only one first, Dole, of that institution, carrying away the honors in the pole vault. He crossed the bar at 11 feet 6 1/2 inches. The score by colleges follows:

The shot-put was won by Rose, Michigan; Hyde, Stanford, second; Miller, Wisconsin, third, distance, 47 feet 1/4 inch. This breaks the intercollegiate record of 44 feet 1/4 inch, formerly held by Kirby, Notre Dame.

The 200-yard dash, first heat, was won by Rice, Michigan; Martin, Indiana, second; Hamilton, Iowa State Normal, third, time, 2:30 seconds.

The high jump was won by Fuhrer, Wisconsin; Dole, Stanford; Veshlag, Purdue; Bellows, Oberlin; Keeler, Michigan, were tied for second place, each one, 5 feet 11 1/2 inches. This breaks the intercollegiate record of 5 feet 11 inches, held by Brewer, of Michigan.

The two-mile run was won by Kellogg, Michigan; McEachern, Wisconsin, second; Verner, Purdue, third, time, 1:20 1/2.

NEED NO ARBITRATION TREATY
Britain Feels Present Relations With
America Are Better.

LONDON, June 5.—The special dispatches reporting that an Anglo-American arbitration treaty is under way have attracted much interest. The Associated Press is authoritatively informed, however, that no negotiations are on foot, or contemplated, looking to a revival of the late Lord Pauncefote's unsuccessful efforts.

The general trend of opinion in official quarters here, at the Foreign Office, is that there is scarcely any necessity for a formal treaty of this kind. It is pointed out that all matters now in dispute between the two countries will go automatically to arbitration.

It is the general opinion of the diplomatic corps accredited to the court of St. James that arbitration, to some extent, have lost their significance by reason of their multiplicity, and it is generally held that the Anglo-American recognition of the spirit of arbitration goes far further to promote the universal adoption of this kind of settlement than would any number of treaties.
