TO GREET PIONEERS

Arrangements For Annual Reunion Complete.

PARADE, SPEECHES, BANQUET

Badges Await the State-Builders at Secretary's Headquarters—Hon. C. B. Moore, 1852, Will Deliver the Annual Address.

All arrangements for the annual reunion of the Oregon Pioneer Association have been substantially perfected. Resident pioneers will kindly call or send to the secretary's headquarters in the rooms of the Oregon Historical Society, City Hall, for the badges for 1904. Badges for any other year will not be honored. Children or young people will not be permitted to wear badges, or to attend the reunion. The badges are not transferrable, and should a badge be found in the possession of any young person it will not be honored. No one under 45 years of age has any right to wear a badge under any circumstances. To do so is simply an imposition, and such steps as may be necessary will be taken to prevent it.

No badges will be issued to pioneers who are not members of the association. Conditions of membership will be stated by the secretary upon application.

A pioneer having a wife or husband who is not a pioneer can secure all the privileges of the reunion by calling upon the secretary of the association for a special admission ticket. No one will be admitted to the Army without a badge or ticket.

Pioneers will assemble at the Portland Hotel at 2 o'clock P. M. next Wednesday. Then Grand Marshal Joseph Buchtel and his aids will form the procession on Yamhill street, fronting east, with the right resting on Sixth street, pioneers of each year falling in behind their respective banners, and march down Sixth street to Ankeny, up Ankeny to Seventh, north on Seventh to Burnside, west on Burnside to Tenth, north on Tenth to the Army. A squad of police will precede the procession.

PERMITS FOR GRAZING.

Nearly 200,000 Sheep Can Go on Cascade Reserve.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 18.—During the season of 1904 the Secretary of the Interior has authorized the grazing of nearly 200,000 head of sheep on the Cascade reserves. Permits for grazing have been issued by the General Land Office under this authority, as have permits for grazing in the Washington and Rainier reserves of Washington. In the former only 20,000 sheep have been admitted, while in the latter 154,000 have been allowed to enter.
