Baseball Game and Events on Track and Field.

YANCOUVER BARRACKS, Wash., Aug. 27.—(Special.)—The first of the series of monthly field days since the Summer vacation took place at the post today. The spirit of emulation was especially strong, as this is the first time the Third Battalion of the Nineteenth Infantry has had to show its athletic ability. The weather was somewhat smoky, but not enough to interfere with sports.

The first game, which was the chief point of interest during the afternoon, was strongly contested. It was between aggregations called first and second groups. The first group was composed of G. H. I. K. L. M. and the Eighth Battery. In this way the players were evenly divided, and though the game was loose throughout from lack of practice, yet some good skill was shown. Sergeant who played second base for the second group, was exceedingly strong; also Walsh, as catcher, made a good showing, while in the first group Falkner did well on the slab and was backed up well by his men. RESERVE IN PERIL

Forest Fire Is Sweeping Toward Bull Run.

STARTED NEAR TOLLGATE

Portland's Water System May Be Greatly Damaged.

RANCHER WILL BE ARRESTED

Set Fire to Slashing Near the Tollgate on the Mount Hood Road, Despite the Warnings of the Forest Rangers.

OREGON CITY, Or., Aug. 27.—(Special.)—Jack Caulfield, who returned tonight from the tollgate on the Mount Hood road, reports that as a result of not heeding the warnings of forest rangers against setting fire in timber, Henry Harmand, a rancher, who lives one mile north of the tollgate, will be arrested by the United States Marshal, on a charge preferred against him by Assistant Chief Forest Ranger Mill Anderson.

Harmand set fire to slashing on his property two days ago and was warned by one of the rangers to watch his fire carefully and not allow it to get beyond control. Yesterday the fire became too much for the men who were watching it and jumped the road and ran east along Zigzag Creek toward the tollgate. Buildings at tollgate were in great danger and the campers at that place became greatly alarmed.

The worst feature of Harmand's case is that the fire became unmanageable and ran up a heavily wooded ravine and is now raging on the ridge that leads to Mount Hood. This ridge is covered by some of the finest timber in the reserve.

Assistant Chief Forest Ranger Anderson was at the tollgate today, making an individual investigation. He advised Harmand that he would be arrested and that an admission of his fault would save an expensive prosecution by the Government, otherwise Harmand will be brought before Judge Bollinger. Harmand is a German and hardly realizes the seriousness of the offense with which he is charged.

The fears of the rangers now are that the fire will cross Sandy River, and in that case it would have full access to the Bull Run country and Portland's water supply system would be in great danger of serious damage. The extent of the fire which has started cannot be told, but hunters at the tollgate say that it will cover several thousand acres before it can be placed under control.

So dense is smoke at Government Camp that objects half a mile distant can hardly be discerned.

CHAMPIONSHIP LACROSSE.

Old Rivals' Game Today Between Portland and Victoria.

The greatest lacrosse game played in Portland in nine years will be the contest on the East Side baseball grounds, Hawthorne avenue, this afternoon at 3 o'clock between the Portland and the veteran lacrosse players from Victoria, B. C. Nine years ago, the old-time rivals, Victoria and Vancouver, B. C., played lacrosse in this city and so close was the contest that the game was a draw, but so evenly matched that they have set the pace here ever since. In the interval, the Victorians have so strengthened their team that it is stated to be the strongest in British Columbia, not only in the famous Westminster, and many critics think it is equal to any of the crack lacrosse teams in the East, teams that are called the "Westminster" and the "Peel." Not a single team in Great Britain, Australia or New Zealand can hope to defeat the crack teams of Ontario, Brooklyn, N. Y., or those of the leading American universities.

Four years ago, the Victorians sailed forth from their native British Columbia, and astonished everybody by battering the Capitals, Shamrocks, Montreals, Nationals and Teacups; but they met their match in the Toronto in a drawn game, 4 to 4. On this Eastern tour, the Victorians were one of the chief star players for the Westminster, and so was George Oddy. More than any other duo, these men helped the Westminster to win the championship, but today these players will appear on the same field as bitter rivals. For Peel will play as inside home for the Victorians, and Oddy as cover point and captain of the Portlanders. Snider and Belfry, who also play today with the Victorians, played here nine years ago in the memorable Victoria-Vancouver match.

Lorimer, the goalkeeper for the Victorians, has a close rival in Braden, the Portlander. Critics think Lorimer plays closer to his goal than Braden. Whether this is so or not, will be seen this afternoon.

At the game between Victoria-Portland at Astoria on Friday, those who were present say the spectators went nearly wild with excitement, as very few of them ever saw a lacrosse game. At Astoria, the scenery is talk of a regatta will ever be held at that city by the sea, except lacrosse be part of the programme.
