





Germans Take Bloody Revenge.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Jan. 7 .- The steam yacht Sea Stern, belonging to the Ger-man Government, reports that 50 natives of the Bismarck Archipelago were shot for the recent murder of ten Romain Cata-olic missionaries. Tomari, the leader of the attack on the mission, met with a tragic end. Great difficulty was experi-enced in tracking him down, but he was finally found, accompanied by his aged mother, hiding in the mountains. The syveriment force signted him behind a tree and opened fire. Tomari fought for life with his gone, with bow and strow and a sling. A shot fired by the expedition-ary party finally plerced his heart, and passing through his body, struck his racht Sea Stern, belonging to the Gerpassing through his body, struck his mother, who fell dead beside him.

Britaln Buys Submarines.

BRITISH TRADE IN 1904.

Increased Exports of Cotton and

Woolen Goods, Decrease in Steel.

Woolen Goods, Decrease in Steel. LONDON, Jan. 7.-The December state-ment of the Board of Trade shows an in-crease of 22,625,500 in imports and \$17,238,000 in exports. The chief increase in imports was in cotion fabrics. The total imports, \$2,726,810,630, and the total exports, \$1,504,009,955, for 1504, arc, well abead of all previous records. Apart from the large increase in the exports of cot-ton and wool manufactures, the principal features of trade were a decline of \$11,-\$57,835 in iron and steel, and \$9,685,000 in apparel, the former largely due to dimin-ished prices, the actual weight of the iron and steel exports being 300,000 tons below those of 1503. The failing off in apparel is entirely accounted for by diminished shipments of clothes to South Africa. Of the imports, foodstuffs show a re-much larger, but for the increase of \$14,-600,000 in the value of singar, although the increase in quantity is only about 1,000,000 hundredweichts.
