Report on Labor Conditions in Hawaii Causes a Sensation.

HONOLULU, Jan. 12, via Victoria, B. C., Jan. 21.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—L. E. Pihnkham, president of the Territorial Board of Health, has succeeded in stirring up a commotion in Hawaii by the submission of an exhaustive report, at the instance of Governor Carter, on labor conditions here.
