

CITY IS GROWING Home-Building in Portland Is Active.

WHAT THE STATISTICS SHOW

Most of the Growth Seems to Be in the Outskirts of the Municipality, Though Every Section Is Improving.

It has been so often said in the past year that Portland is a city of homes, that the remark has lost its force. In fact, it is more true than ever.

House-building is going on in every direction, as shown by a few buildings picked out at random from the list taken out at the City Hall last week.

From this representative list it would seem that the East Side is receiving the most attention, which is a fact. The amount of money expended is about equally divided, but what is spent on one house on the West Side is spent on two on the East Side.

While there is a certain amount of building in the heart of the city in the residence districts, most of it is on the outskirts. There is hardly a section which is not feeling the activity.

Most people have been merely making homes for themselves, and many of them have made money as a result.

To get a home in Portland is an easy thing to accomplish, as terms are made within the reach of any income, but where to house the family is a question of the day.

In spite of the hopeful attitude of the Lewis and Clark Accommodation Bureau, there is a fear that Portland is planning to secure one of the railroads alone, show that the outside attendance is going to be remarkably large.

Most of the hotels, of course, are steadily giving themselves up to the inevitable, and when their houses are filled will throw up their hands, saying they cannot hold one more.

The Portland in planning to secure one of two near-by frame houses for the overflow, and the Belvedere will be completely remodeled, but the other hotels will not attempt to enlarge their capacity.

Several new hotels have been recently opened, however, and the hotel capacity of the city has been doubled within the year.
