Municipal Association at Work.

WILL REIMBURSE SHERIFF

County Refuses to Allow Sums Spent.

COST OF GAMBLING CRUSADE

Official Is Out of Pocket Six Hundred Dollars, Which the Citizens of Portland Will Try to Make Good.

Thomas Ward, Sheriff of Multnomah County, is to be given the sum of \$600 by the Municipal Association, the faction that endorsed his candidacy, tempted victory to perch on his banners and established a guardianship over his term of office.

The man who drove the gamblers out of the Rose City and purged its precincts of systematic robbery under the guise of chance, who wrested the inhabitants of Chinatown and put a stop to their fan-tan and their lotteries, declares that he expended the sum of \$600 from his own pocket in so doing, and he has vouchers to show that he speaks truth. The county which Thomas Ward serves has looked upon the bills and declared that there is no funds for their liquidation. As a result, the bank account of the Sheriff has not been reimbursed, and now the Municipal Association has taken the matter in hand and will pay Ward his money.

Discussed at Recent Meeting.

The situation was thoroughly discussed at a recent meeting of the executive committee of the association. It was shown that the Sheriff had spent the sum of \$600 out of his own pocket for the employment of detectives in gathering evidence enough to convict the gamblers arrested, and for other incidental expenses which should have been defrayed by the county officials. It was also shown that Sheriff Ward at present has a suit pending against the county he serves, in which he is attempting to regain \$200 paid as salaries to deputies appointed to guard the Warwick Pool-room, the Portland Club and other resorts where gamblers were stationed during the recent anti-gambling campaign. It was revealed to the executive committee that the additional \$600, while having been expended in causes the nature of which should lead the county to assume the debt, could not possibly be collected from the county, because the method of procedure had been slightly irregular. The Sheriff hired his men on the spur of the moment, when they were actually needed, and he didn't make any noise about it. He knew that to ask the county beforehand would be to reveal his plans to the enemy and frustrate the ends of justice. He expended the coin and took his chances in regaining it.

When the executive committee heard and understood these things, it immediately began to sympathize with Sheriff Thomas Ward, and the result was that a committee was appointed to gather the sum of \$600 by subscription, the money to go to the Sheriff's bank account. It was also decided that, in case Sheriff Ward was unable to win his suit against the County of Multnomah, the association would also attempt to defray that expense.

Members of the association were reticent yesterday about discussing the matter.

Will Raise the Money.

"We shall raise as much as possible among ourselves before asking anything from outsiders," said one. "We feel that the Sheriff is not called upon to stand this expense himself, especially as the money was expended in bringing law-breakers to the bar of justice. We are going about the matter quietly and think we shall succeed. There is no cause for haste."

It was impossible yesterday to discover the amount already actually raised. The subscription slips are in the hands of several of the members of the executive committee, and are being circulated among the association people. It was estimated by one member that more than \$200 had already been promised.

That Sheriff Ward is actually out \$600 no one doubts. It is known that on many occasions he engaged detectives to gather evidence without making the matter public, fearing that should he ask the county for help the enemy would immediately plan to offset the campaign and be on guard against the men engaged. In the strenuous fight against the gamblers the Sheriff had no time to waste in asking for and receiving appropriations. He was compelled to act quickly and on his own responsibility. As a result the Sheriff is out \$600, and the Municipal Association, which backed him up in the crusade against the gamblers, feels in duty bound to make up the amount and give it to the Sheriff. The Sheriff himself has nothing to say regarding the matter; he leaves it to the association.

Chamber of Commerce Active.

The first quarterly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce to be held in accordance with the provisions of the amended constitution and by-laws will be on Wednesday, April 12, at 3:29 o'clock in the afternoon, in the Chamber of Commerce Hall. At this meeting the business of the past quarter will be gone over by the members of the organization and the work of the board of trustees will be sanctioned.

The officers of the Chamber are now busy in preparing a descriptive catalogue of the Port of Portland for the use and benefit of the shipowners and navigators who sail into the Portland harbor. The pamphlet will contain the rules and regulations of the port, together with a large amount of data which will be of interest to those who transact business in the shipping of the city. The circulars will be sent to every shipowner who comes to this port and to all pilots and rivermen making use of the waters of the Willamette.
