

TAKES FIRST PRIZE

Champion Mark's Rush Best Dog in the Show.

ALWAYS A PRIZE-WINNER

He Won at Buffalo, Brooklyn, Boston, New York, Rochester, Paterson, Seattle and Now the Honors at Portland.

Ch. Mark's Rush, owned by George Bleistein, president of the Buffalo Kennel Club, a splendid pointer, won the prize at the bench show of the Portland Kennel Club last night for the best dog of any breed in the show.

There is no wonder he took the highest award offered, for he has been in bench shows for three years and has not yet been defeated. This year alone he took all the prizes he was open to at Buffalo, Brooklyn, Boston, New York, Rochester, Paterson, N. J., Seattle and now in Portland.

Five other special prizes were awarded last night. At that time all the owners of winners had the opportunity to show their dogs, and they used it. The ring was filled with happy men and women with a group of conscious canines standing up to be passed upon.

On the outside of the ring the other few hundred dogs which did not rise above mediocrity, pulled on their leashes and barked, yapped and yelped their heads off.

Endcliffe Fascination, owned by Mrs. G. Steadman Thomas, of Hamilton, Mass., took the prize offered for the best dog owned by a lady. This was presented by Mrs. F. W. Wamley.

Multnomah Flirt, owned by W. R. Feckheimer, won the prize for the best puppy bred in Oregon and owned by a member of the club. The prize was offered by Mrs. W. B. Feckheimer.

Multnomah Boy, also owned by W. B. Feckheimer, won the Blumauer-Frank cup, for the best dog or bitch bred in Oregon and owned by a member of the club.

The Portland Cocker Kennels won the prize offered by Mueller & Meyer for the largest number of dogs of either sex owned and shown by any exhibitor or kennel.

Portland Lord Sheils Douglas, a cocker spaniel, owned by George Withrow, of Arlington, Or., won the Ram McCartney prize for the best dog in the miscellaneous class.
