



TAKES PLACE JUNE OR JULY

Battling Nelson Posts a Forfeit or \$2500, and Britt Will Forfeit Title If It Is Not Covered.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 6.-Representa tives of Jimmy Britt, the lightweight champion, and of Battling Nelson met to-day and agreed to meet next Wednesday afternoon to sign articles for a match between the two puglists. Britt's brother agreed that the match would be then signed up, and Nelson accordingly posted \$2500 forfeit.

The fight will take place in this city the last week in June or the first week in July. No club was mentioned. Upon a suggestion made by Charley Mitchell, the English boxer, the Britt contingent consented to the forfeiture of the champion-ship title to Nelson in the event of Britt's failure to cover Nelson's forfeit.
