

UNIONS QUARREL ABOUT STRIKE

Shea Threatens Revenge on Building Trades, but Without Effect.

STRIKERS' FUNDS FAILING

Fend Between Teamsters and Builders Accompanies Riots in Chicago Lumber District—Army of Police Employed.

CHICAGO, May 27.—While numerous small riots were in progress today, both in the downtown streets and in the lumber district, the leaders of the teamsters' strike and the officials of the building trades were engaged in quarrels of their own.

The action of the building trades last night in withdrawing from the teamsters their financial and moral support angered the teamsters, and they lost no time today in calling upon the representatives of the building trades and demanding to know what they meant by "going back" on the teamsters in the thick of the fight.

President Shea, of the Teamsters' Union, declared that he would order out every safe-mover and machinery-rigger in the city on Monday morning, and stop work on all buildings where the members of the building trades are employed.

New Efforts at Peace Abortive.

Several new efforts were made during the day to settle the strike, but none of them amounted to anything. The Chicago Teamsters' Association made another effort to induce the teamsters to arbitrate the question of delivering goods to boycotted houses.

The labor leaders made another effort to induce Vice-President Fairbanks to use his good offices in settling the strike, and a number of the members of the Teamsters' Association joined them in the move.

Shea Is Breaking Down.

President Shea was not seen tonight and his colleagues say that he has been very sick all day and evening. The strain of the strike work and his experiences in court having caused almost a nervous breakdown.

An armed force of 1500 men, police and deputy sheriffs, said to be almost as large as the entire National Guard of Illinois, was in command of the strikers. In return today a call for troops seemed to be increasingly distant.

The response to the request for contributions from the country at large has, it is alleged, not been up to expectations, and with a daily expense of \$10,000 financial stringency may be the rock on which the strike will be wrecked.

WORK BEGINS IN SUMMER

EXPRESS CARS BLOWN TO PIECES

North Coast Limited Held Up in Bearmouth Cut in Montana.

PASSENGERS UNMOLESTED

Fate of the Messenger in the Coach Wrecked by Three Highwaymen Has Not Been Determined.

MISSOULA, Mont., May 27.—Northern Pacific passenger train No. 2 (the North Coast Limited), eastbound, was held up tonight at 11:35, at Bearmouth cut, about 40 miles east of this city, and the express car blown to pieces. Three men are known to have been concerned in the crime, but details of their actions are lacking.

No fatalities are reported. No. 2 left Missoula behind time, in charge of Conductor Sayer and Engineer Wilson. As the train pulled into Bearmouth cut, a man was noticed walking ahead of the train, carrying a valise. Signal lights were displayed at the station, and as the train slowed down, Engineer Wilson was covered with a gun by one man, while the other two uncoupled the baggage and express cars and ordered the engineer to pull ahead.

When the cut-off cars reached a point three miles east of Bearmouth station, in a desolate section, the engine was stopped and, under cover of guns, the engineer and firemen were ordered to tell the express messenger to open his door. Dynamite was placed under the car and the charge exploded, wrecking the car, but whether the messenger escaped or not is not known at this time.

Meager word was sent here and to Drummond. Sheriff Graham wired to Deer Lodge to have the bloodhounds sent from the penitentiary, and immediately organized a posse. A special was made up, and five horses taken with the party from here. Twenty men are under arms at Drummond and will join the Sheriff at the scene of the hold-up.

sions being discussed from a business standpoint, facts being given, and money being cared to investigate, there has been little but bitter denunciation. The manner in which the whole matter has been treated induces this company to believe that the municipality is much opposed to any extension of the lease on any terms. This being so, the city attorney has advised the company that it has been passed or to enter into any extension of the term of the present ordinance becomes a law, it will not be accepted by it.

In just manner the lease will be allowed to die is not yet determined. The suggestion has been made, however, that when the Councils meet on Thursday, the Mayor will be asked to return the ordinance, when the action taken on it can be rescinded.

Injunction Suits Go On.

The withdrawal of the United Gas Improvement Company's offer is undoubtedly a signal victory for Mayor Weaver in his fight against the "organization," though it does not mean the end of the battle. The injunction proceedings brought by David Smythe, ex-Director of Public Safety, and Peter E. Costello, ex-Director of Public Works, against Mayor Weaver and their successors, Colonel Sheldon Potter and Lincoln Acker, to restrain the Mayor's appointees from conducting the lower court for argument, and the leaders will make a determined effort to have the temporary injunction made permanent. The temporary injunction issued by the Common Pleas Court was rendered inoperative by a writ of supersedeas procured by the Mayor's counsel from the Supreme Court. Chief Justice Mitchell, of the higher court, has, however, sent the case back to the lower court for argument, and the supersedeas is in effect only until the question of injunction has been decided by that tribunal.

In answer to questions, Mr. Durham, leader of the organization, said: "We have no statements whatever to make in regard to the withdrawal of the new gas lease by the United Gas Improvement Company." Three Guilty of Wife-Murder.

JACKSON, Tenn., May 27.—(Special.)—Unless Governor Cox intervenes the Sheriff of Shelby County will have four men to hang on July 18. Three more men had their sentences affirmed in the court today and the date for their execution fixed. Last week the court named July 18 as the date for the hanging of Toole Taylor and James Norfleet, Major Mills and A. M. Miles were sentenced to die on that day. All the three men given the extreme penalty of the law today are negroes and all three have been convicted of wife murder. It is regarded as one of the strangest coincidences the court has dealt with in many years.

MAP ILLUSTRATING THE NAVAL SITUATION IN THE FAR EAST



The above map shows the country and the waters adjacent to the present location of the Russian and Japanese fleets. The Russian fleet appears to have assembled at Woosung, the port at the mouth of the Yang-tee-Kiang River, and at the Saddle Islands, 60 miles southeast of that port.

The Russian fleet passed through the Tugaur Strait, which is between the Aru and the Tsushima Islands. These two groups of islands are in the middle of the Korean Strait.

On one side of the Korean Strait the Japanese have the harbor of Ma-San-Pho, near Fusan, the terminus of the railroad which they have been building along the center of the Korean peninsula to Wiju, on the Yalu River. On the other side is the great naval arsenal and dockyard at Sasebo, on the island of Kyushu. Directly opposite the Tsushima Islands is Shimonoski, the main point for the embarkation of troops for Manchuria, on the south end of the island of Nippon.
