TOKIO, June 3.-Torpedoboat-destroyers which have returned to Sase-bo, furnish details of the capture of Vice-Ažmiraj Rojestvensky. Toe de-stroyers Kasumi, Usugmo, Sazanami and Kageru were ordered to attack the Russian warships the night of May 27, and were steaming ahead when they suddenly encountered a number of Russian ships. The Kasumi narrowly escaped a collision with a Russian cruiser, the closeness of which seems to have saved the destroyers from being damaged by the heavy fire which according to the Russian naval regula-the Russians directed on them. RUSSIAN ARMY IMPROVES.

Linievitch Disciplines Men Whom Kuropatkin Demoralized.

SPECIAL CABLE. ST. PETERSBURG. June 4.—According to advices received from Manchuria by the War Office and reliable newspapers. indications point to a wholesome char of disciplinary methods in the Russi army at the front. The War Office is receipt of a communication stating that while the damage done by ex-Communder-in-Chief Kuropatkin may be beyond rem-edy, the fact remains that General Linie-vitch has started in raising the merale of the army to such an extent that its pitiful remnants are in a better position today to withstand an onslaught on the part of Japan than was the whole army of Liso

During the battle the Oleg and Aurora were within range of our Third and Fourth squadrons and were on fire. They may have escaped, but it will take time to restore their fighting power."

(According to dispatches from Petersburg, the Izamrud was blown up by her commander after running on a rock in Visdimir Bay. The Almaz reached Vladivostok early in the week, and the Oleg, Aurora and Jemichug arrived at Manila today.)

ADMIRAL SENDS FLOWERS.

HOISTED FRENCH FLAG FIRST Yamamoto Honors Rojestvensky With Can Readily Put One Million Men Sympathetic Letter.

TOKIO, June 4.-(10 A. M.)-Admiral Minister of the Navy. dispatched flowers for the room of Rear-Admiral Rojestvensky. Accompanying the flowers was a letter to the wounded Russian officer, saying: "I beg to express that three war vessels first put into the harbor of Sual, a town in the Province for the sake of your fatherland. I cannot refrain from sympathizing with you in your wounded condition, and hope the ac-commodations of our hospitals and ability of our naval surgeons will ease your suf fering and speedily restore your health."
Admiral Yamamoto also sent a general letter to the wounded Russian officers and men expressing the hope that their suf-fering would soon be ended and that they would speedily recover.

FORTS TOOK PART IN BATTLE

ing Osliabia. NAGASAKI, June 1.-Survivors' statements show that the Japanese maneuvers drove a portion of the Russian fleet under fire of the forts on Tsu Islands, which sank the battleship Osliabia. The construction committee of the Admiralty Council has reported to the Emperor in favor of a naval scheme twice and a half that lost in the present war. The great majority of the naval archi-tects and constructors are making ef-forts again to suddenly adopt this scheme and to urge their construction. They point to the fact that the Retvisan and Czarewitch, which were constructed Czarewitch, which were constructed abroad, were attacked numberless times with torpedoes and shells at Port Arthur, and are affoat even now, while Ro-

jestvensky's ships, built at St. Petersburg and Libau, sank in a few hours. Experts declare that the latest-built battleships at St. Petersburg were formidable on paper, and that the elementary rules of naval construction were not observed. The world has not yet learned that the law. that the laws of logic and sanity, much less human motives, do not control Rus-sian policy, hence there was almost uni-versal expectation following the news of the battle of the Sca of Japan that peace negotiations soon would be opened.
