OREGON LAND-FRAUD TRIALS

First Skirmish Will Begin Tomorrow Morning in Court.

HOW JURY WILL BE DRAWN

Judge Gilbert Will Not Make Formal Notice When the Members Are to Be Selected to Try the Case.

Senator Mitchell and the Oregon land-fraud trials will share the public interest with the Exposition from now on for the greater part of the Summer. Today all of the principal actors in the drama will be in the city, and tomorrow morning the first skirmish of the long fight will take place. United States District Attorney Francis J. Heney will reach the city this morning from San Francisco. Judge De Haven who will preside at the land-fraud trials, also left San Francisco Friday night, and will be in Portland today, ready for the convention of the court tomorrow morning. Mr. Heney is also accompanied by his stenographer, Irvin Rittenhouse, who was with him during the first part of the now famous grand jury's session last Winter. W. J. Burns will reach the city this morning over the O. R. & N. from the East.

Defense Is Ready. On the other side of the argument, all of the participants are in waiting. A. S. Bennett, of The Dalles, will be in Portland either this evening or early in the morning, to present his argument to the demurrers when they are taken up by the court for consideration. Senator Thurston, who will be Senator Mitchell's chief counsel, has been in the city for some time, and during all of that period has been familiarizing himself with the cases which are to come under his charge.

The demurrers upon which the argument of tomorrow will be based are founded upon the ground that the indictments do not set forth sufficient facts to constitute a crime, that they are indefinite and uncertain in their allegations, that there has been irregularity in the empanelling and drawing and conducting of the jury which found the instruments, and that the jury was not properly constituted. These and other allegations on the part of the defense will be the subject of the arguments to be made tomorrow morning before Judge De Haven by Mr. Heney in behalf of the Government, and Mr. Thurston and Mr. Bennett for Senator Mitchell. Judge Gilbert convened his court for a short time yesterday morning and handed down his decision in regard to the recent motion of Senator Thurston asking that the court immediately make an order for the drawing of the jury, and at the same time direct the clerk of the court to issue notice to defendants as to time and place of drawing, that they might be present. Judge Gilbert held that the drawing of the panel was open to the public and that any one might attend who so desired. He declined, however, to name the date for the drawing or to make an order to that effect other than as his discretion. The court also held that notice would be given and that he would not instruct the clerk to make notice of his order. In other words, if the defendants became aware of the time set by the court for the jury to be drawn, it would be proper for them to witness the act, but the clerk would make no announcement of the order of the court.

How Jurors Will Be Selected. It was also announced yesterday by Judge Gilbert that the work of drawing the jury would follow the state practice in accordance with the ruling made by Judge Bellinger on the Mitchell plea of abatement. This ruling of the court will do away with the contention of the defendants that the practice followed for the Government officials, the United States Marshal is not a fit and competent person to officiate in selecting the men who will try the cases. In the federal practice the jury is drawn by the Jury Commissioner, the United States Marshal and the clerk of the court, each drawing a name from the jury-box in rotation. If this practice were to be followed, A. Bush, the Jury Commissioner of Salem; Captain Sladen, the clerk of the court, and C. J. Reed, the Marshal, would each choose a name from the box, one after the other, until the panel was filled. The ruling made by Judge Gilbert yesterday will change this mode of proceeding, however, and Captain Sladen will select all the names from the box, while the other two men will sit by and watch that the work is done according to the law. By the end of the present week all of the preliminary steps leading to the trial will have been taken, and it is thought that the work of selecting the jury preparatory to presenting the evidence will begin on Monday, June 13.

SENATOR ANKENY IS HERE

Comes on Business Matters and to See the Exposition. Senator Levi Ankeny, of Walla Walla, is a Portlan visitor, having come down from the Garden City to attend to business matters here and at Vancouver. He is accompanied by Mrs. Ankeny, and after a few days' visit will return home by way of Seattle. According to Mr. Ankeny, the Walla Walla country is in a most prosperous condition. Also, according to the Senator's observation, Washington factional politics are in a dormant condition, and are likely to continue so for some time to come. "Walla Walla has paved streets and many new brick buildings," remarked Mr. Ankeny yesterday. "Crop conditions this year have been excellent, and we will ship out a big harvest later on. There is nothing new in the political situation in our state. The various factions are drawing together after their fights, and we now have a solid front. I am not down here on any political errand, simply on business. Interests in Vancouver and in this city bring me to Portland." Mr. and Mrs. Ankeny are visiting Mrs. Ankeny's sister, Mrs. Lewis L. McArthur, on Glisan street. They will leave for Seattle or Tacoma on Tuesday or Wednesday.
