**WILL BUILD ELECTRIC POWER LINE.**—B. S. Bowtell has gone to Russia, B. C., where he will superintend the construction of a 200-mile wire line for the transmission of electric power for a large smelter at Greenwood. The line will be stretched through a rough and timbered country, and a right-of-way 100 feet wide will be cleared. It will take about 18 months to complete the job. The line is for the Western Kootenay Power & Light Company, for which Mr. Bowtell has built several lines before.

At each sermon there will be distributed free a large picture to each member of the congregation, to be studied in connection with the sermon.
