GREAT RIVER TRAFFIC.-According to the Scientific American, the draws of the bridges on the Chicago River are opened between 18,000 and 19,000 times per year, and says Chicago River is the busiest in the world. Willamette River traffic now surpasses that record. For the month of June 2078 boats passed through the draw of the steel bridge and 1465 passed through the draw of the Burnside bridge. For July, 1994, 1639 boats passed through the Burnside bridge draw. 
