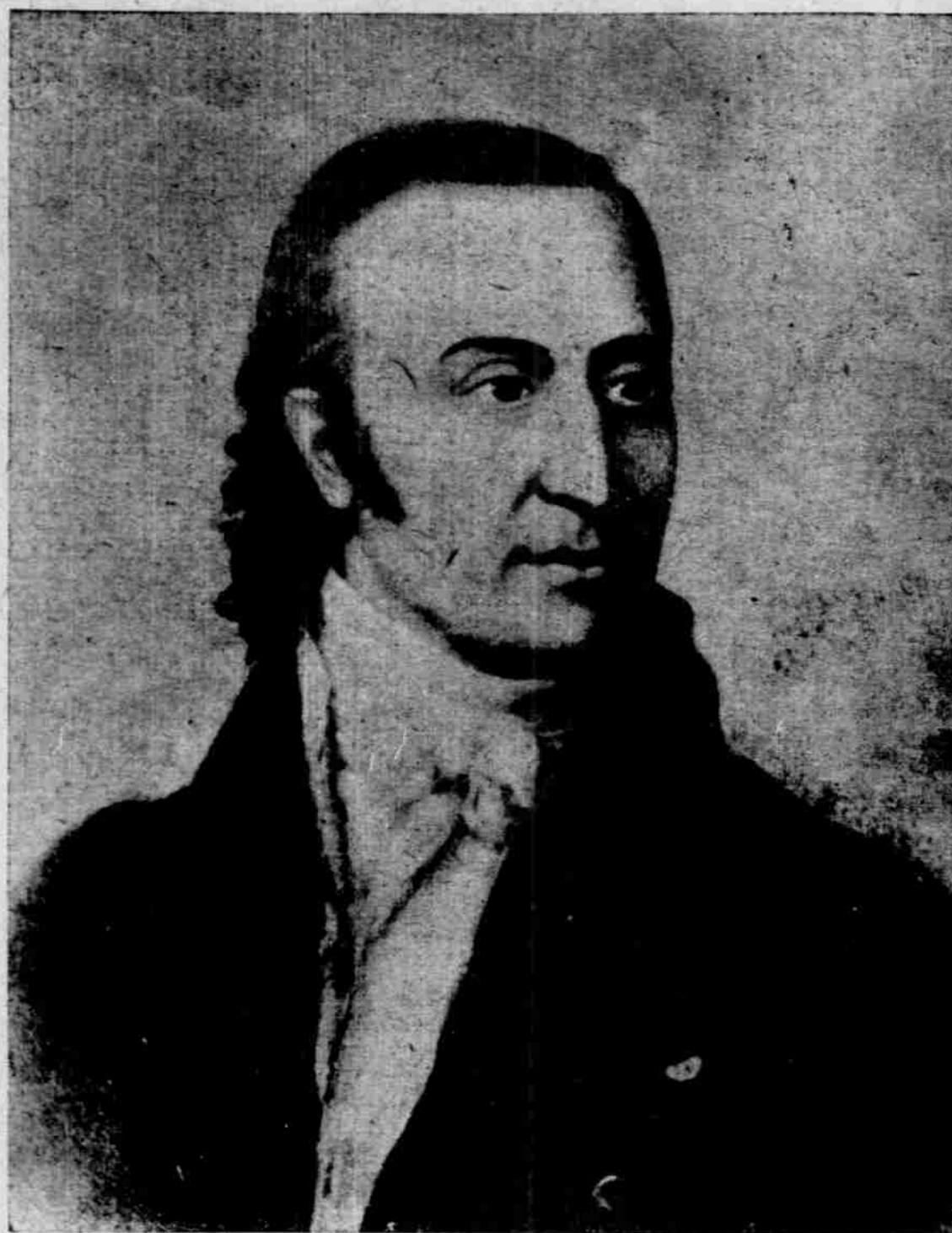

Father of Legislation for Oregon Country

PORTRAIT OF DR. JOHN FLOYD HUNG IN THE OREGON BUILDING AT THE LEWIS AND CLARK EXPOSITION

FIRST MAN TO SEEK CONGRESSIONAL LEGISLATION FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE OREGON COUNTRY



DR. JOHN FLOYD.

THERE was recently hung in the Oregon State building at the Lewis and Clark Fair, a portrait, which is of unusual interest to citizens of this state. It is the portrait of Dr. John Floyd, one time a member of Congress and subsequently Governor of the commonwealth of Virginia. His interest in Oregonians lies in the fact that Dr. Floyd was the first man in the Congress of the United States to introduce legislation concerning the development and welfare of the great Oregon country; and that he was one of the earliest as well as one of the warmest friends of this section of the United States. The portrait was loaned to the Oregon Historical Society through the courtesy of Dr. George Ben Johnston, of Richmond, Va., grandson of Dr. John Floyd, and one of the most distinguished surgeons in this country, having just completed a term as president of the American Association.

Dr. John Floyd was in many respects, in more respects, indeed, than in the case with many men of note, a very remarkable man. Of pioneer blood himself he early recognized the tremendous importance to his country of the great territory lying at the Northwest, on the shores of the Pacific. His conviction of the desirability of incorporating this vast territory as a part of the United States was doubtless vivified by his close connection with General George Rogers Clark and other members of the Clark family.

His Father Killed by Indians.

Dr. Floyd was born in 1782, a son of Colonel John Floyd, friend and fellow-pioneer of Daniel Boone. His birth occurred about two weeks after the death of his father, who was killed by the Indians in a bloody battle near where the City of Louisville, Ky., now stands. In 1796, when only 14 years old, John Floyd was sent to Dickinson College. Subsequently he went to Carlisle. He began the study of medicine under Dr. Ferguson, of Louisville. In 1808 he married Miss Letitia Preston, of the noted Virginia family of that name. He then decided to pursue his studies at the University of Pennsylvania, from which he took his degree in 1808, entering at once upon the practice of his profession.

Though deep in public affairs, Dr. Floyd did not relinquish the practice of medicine. His winters were spent in Washington, but during the summer his home became the shelter of the sick and suffering for miles around, who had heard of his skill and who were often his guests for days and even for weeks. He was the last Governor of Virginia to serve under the old constitution and first to serve under the new constitution. Upon the expiration of his last term he was escorted from the Executive mansion by the militia as a tribute and the highest mark of appreciation that could be paid him for his services to the state.

In spite of his many private and public duties, Governor Floyd found time to pursue the study of music, in which he took great pleasure. With a wonderful physique and great strength, Governor Floyd combined dignified and courteous manners and a magnetic personality. It is declared that few men have been more beloved by friends and family. He died August 14, 1837, when only 54 years of age. His son, John B. Floyd, also became a Governor of Virginia, and was

Secretary of War under President Buchanan. One daughter, wife of the late United States Senator John W. Johnston, survives, and now resides in Richmond, Va. She is the mother of Dr. George Ben Johnston referred to above.

Scorns Bribe of British Title.

Dr. Floyd was descended from the Floyd family that sailed from Wales in 1629 in their own ship and settled in Virginia. His grandfather, William Floyd, married Obadiah Davis, daughter of Robin Davis, a Welshman. His father, Colonel John Floyd, eldest son of William, was born in Amherst County, Virginia, in 1751. He was very prominent in the early history of Kentucky. At one time he went on an expedition with George Rogers Clark to repel the Indians who had been incited to an uprising by the British. Both Clark and Floyd on this occasion were offered the bribe of a British title if they would make over the country to the enemy.

During the Revolution Colonel John Floyd was in command of a privateer. He was captured, but managed to escape to France. There he received assistance from Marie Antoinette, and was able to return to America. He married Miss Jane Buchanan, and was the father of three sons—William, George Rogers Clark and John.
