FOREST SUPERINTENDENT, RECOVERY. Adolph Asthoff, superintendent of forest rangers in the Cascade division, is still confined to his room in St. Vincent's Hospital by injury recently received while inspecting his district, but is making good progress toward recovery. He was able to sit up for a time yesterday, and his wound is in favorable condition. It will be about three weeks before he can resume active duties. Mr. Asthoff's district extends from the Columbia south to the Three Sisters in the Cascade Mountains, in which there are many rangers. His daughter is looking after the office details at present, and trained rangers are out in the district. Danger of forest fires will not be imminent until about a month, and by that time Superintendent Asthoff will be able to be on the ground.

COMING TO ESTABLISH A SPRUCE MATCH FACTORY. John Dickinson, a real estate dealer of the East Side, says that capitalists are coming from Sweden to Portland to establish a large match factory. Matches are to be manufactured out of spruce timber, of which there is an abundance in the Northwest. For the past three years Mr. Dickinson has been corresponding with these men, who represent large concerns in Sweden, and recently he got word they were on the way to Portland to establish a factory here. Mr. Dickinson says it is their intention to establish one of the largest factories in the Northwest. Some time ago he sent to Sweden some Oregon spruce to be turned into matches to ascertain the value of the wood for that purpose. The test proved satisfactory.
