AT THE EXPOSITION.

The quiet that has prevailed at the Exposition during the past week will be quite overbalanced by the gay times that are to come after the middle of the month, when more Governors begin to wend their way Expositionwards. Just to give a foretaste of the social doings that will result, here follows a resume of a few official affairs that are scheduled to take place.

On August 15, which will be Louisiana Purchase Exposition day, the Lewis and Clark officials will pay their respects to the beautiful wealth of the Mississippi Valley's wondrous dream city. They will acknowledge the splendid inspiration of that wonderful pageant in the upbuilding of the great Exposition of the Northwest. President David Rowland Francis, of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, will be in Portland, and in compliment to him and to the vanishing loveliness of last year's vision of beauty at St. Louis, President Goode and his aids will give a garden fete in Centennial Park.

On August 16 the Exposition management tenders a dinner to Governor Deneen, of Illinois, in the New York State building, and on the following day, August 17, there will be a mammoth reception to Governor and Mrs. Deneen given by the Illinois Commission in the Administration Pavilion. For this 2000 invitations will be issued.

August 18 is the date set for a complimentary dinner to Lieutenant-Governor Bruce, of New York, and on the evening of August 19 a reception in his honor will be given in the pavilion. August 21 a luncheon to Governor Mickey, of Nebraska, will be given by Exposition officials in the New York State building, and in the evening of the same day there will be a luncheon party and garden fete in honor of Lieutenant-Governor Bruce, of New York. Nor does this close the succession of "Governors' events."

On the 22d of the month there is to be a dinner in honor of Governor MacDonald, of Colorado, in the New York building, and on the 24th a dinner to Governor Cutler, of Utah, also at the New York building.
