MEETINGS ARE SUCCESSFUL.

The meetings at Jennings Lodge, under the auspices of the Evangelical Association, are well attended. Sixteen out of the 25 ministers of the association in the state, are taking part. The intention is to make the Jennings Lodge grounds the permanent place for holding the conventions and campmeetings. The association has purchased eight and one-half acres of land there, and will erect a permanent tabernacle. So far during the meetings many of the lots in the tract have been sold, and it is from the proceeds that the tabernacle will be built. Situated on the Willamette River with a gentle slope and near the electric railway the grounds are well adapted to be made a general convention place. Today the congregations of the Portland Evangelical Association will adjourn to the campground.

There was no alarm turned in for the fire department, and even if there had been it would have been impossible to have saved the building, as it is too far out. Nearly all the furniture was saved through the efforts of Mrs. Taylor and the neighbors. The cause of the fire is not known. The loss is about \$1000. Mr. Taylor had just completed his home and recently occupied it. There is no fire protection in the neighborhood.

It extends out to deep water and has both an upper and lower floor for high and low water. Boats have been using the dock for several days, although not finished. It is expected to be a great benefit, as the sawmills had cut off steamers from landing at Lower St. Johns.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon from their home on West avenue and the O. R. & N. tracks. Mrs. Black went to Grass Valley on a visit, and had only been there a week when the child was taken ill and died.

AGED MAN'S FALL.—Charles Turner, a stableman on Tenth street between Johnson and Kearney streets, while carrying a sack of oats from the loft to the floor below, fell down the stairs yesterday afternoon and sustained severe injuries to his head and body. Turner is more than 75 years old. It was found necessary to have him taken to the Good Samaritan Hospital.
