BRING DELEGATES TO PORTLAND—Rev. J. F. Ghorrmey, pastor of the Central Christian Church, East Salmon and Twentieth streets, has gone to San Francisco to attend the American Missionary Convention, which opened there on August 11, and which will continue through to the 25th. By next Sunday it is estimated that 1000 delegates to this convention will arrive in Portland. Some will remain several days and visit the Exposition and the city. Members of the Christian denomination are making arrangements to receive these delegates and welcome them to the city and to the churches. Dr. Ghorrmey's mission to San Francisco is to invite the delegates to the convention to return home by way of Portland, and his powers of persuasion are known to be strong when it comes to picturing the glories of Portland and surroundings.
