


ARRANGEMENTS NOW MADE

Its Tracks Will Join Southern Pacific and Northern Pacific for Through Business, Freight and Passenger.

> "Financial arrangements have been made in London for connection of the Portland, Nehalem & Tillamook road with both the Southern Pacific and Northern Pacific tracks," said William Reid, secre-tary of the company, yesterday, when asked as to whether any relations existed between that company and the Oregon Traction Company, which is having some misunderstanding with the contractors and on which construction work has stopped. Mr. Reid said further in an-

swer to questions:
"Propositions for consolidation of the interests of these lines were never for a moment entertained for the reason that the financial arrangement mentioned has been made.
