


NO GROUND FOR UNEASINES C. C. Hutchinson Tells of Steps

Taken Within the Law.

PORTLAND, Sept. 2-(To the Ed. tor)-The infimations appearing in The Oregonian from your truatworthy Salem orrespondent cause some uneasiness on the part of settlers upon the lands now being irrigated under contract with the state by the Deschutes Irrigation & Powr Company

It is well understood that the title of these lands passes by patent from the United States to the state only upon proof that sufficient water had been furnished in canals for the reclamation and permanent irrigation of the same. This proof must be furnished by the company having contract for such reclamation, and every step must be approved by both state and United States officials, and the iaw is explicit in demanding this proof which is the guarantee to the settler of a future water supply.

Everyone knows that the Deschutes River carries every day of every year much more water than can ever be utilized in the irrigation of the 215,000 acres


