

OREGON'S FIRST FIGHT AGAINST KING ALCOHOL

As Early as 1845 the Provisional Legislature Enacted a Prohibitory Law—Signatures to Temperance Pledges.

WIDESPREAD attention given to Temperance, and particularly the Temperance Congress recently held at the Lewis and Clark Fair, prompt me to set down for information to the present generation the efforts made to promote temperance and Prohibition in the pioneer days of Oregon.

peace and happiness of the people as well as to the prosperity of the country. The first grand object of all governments should be, by every possible means, to secure the fundamental principles of government, defining the grant of powers extended to each department, and to enforce them.

Account of a prohibition meeting, taken from the issue of the Oregon Spectator of March 19, 1846. At a large and respectable meeting of the ladies and gentlemen of Oregon City, held in the Methodist Church on Thursday evening, the 12th inst., the following resolutions were adopted.

First Prohibitory Law. Following is the bill passed in December, 1845, by the Legislature and printed in the Oregon Spectator, Vol. 1, No. 1, published at Astoria, Oregon, February 2, 1846, W. G. T. Vaut, editor.
