P. at Cascade kept the fish from going to the Upper Clackamas hatchery, where the Spring salmon eggs are taken. Only a few, about 100, got up the dam, but there was no result. Nearly all these fish died and no eggs were obtained. The Clackamas hatcheries will likely have to be abandoned.

The North Shore Boom & Driving Company is restrained from constructing booming works on territory previously appropriated by the Nicomen Company, but not actually put to use.

The Supreme Court holds that a boom-

ing company, as a quasi public-service corporation, may anticipate future necessities and may for that purpose hold territory not in actual use to the exclusion of other companies. Its rights under its plans filed in the office of the Secretary of State are analogous to the rights of railway companies in filing right-of-way plans. The decision is a reversal of the lower court.
