NATIVES WILL SELL BAIT 000,000.

Vessels Loading in Harbor Are Doing So Contrary to the Regulations and Law May Have to Be Invoked.

ST. JOHNS, N. F., Oct. 14 .- The situation on the West Coast created by the abrogation of the special privileges granted to American fishermen is becoming serious. Two American vesels are now at Bonne Bay in quest of herring, but as there are none now in the bay, no trouble has arisen. The Pisheries Department Warden states that he will be powerless unless help is given if the herring do stock the hay, for the people have expressed their intention of selling balt to these vessels. The penalty of purchasing balt is confiscation of vessel and out-

A telegram from Bay St. George to-day states that two American captains have taken on board some 20 New-foundlanders and proceeded to Syd-ney, N. S., where they will ship these and return to the Bay of Islands to catch herring. This is done to evade the foreign fishing vessels law, which prohibits masters of such vessels en-gaging any person to form part of their crew for catching bait on any part of the coast of Newfoundland. LONDON, Oct. 15.—The Observer says it understands Great Britain has agreed to maintain the treaty of 1855, which guarantees the integrity of Scandinavia. so far as Norway is concerned, on condition that a monarchy be established.

The paper adds that the candidature of Prince Charles of Denmark to the Nor wegian throne has been virtually accept ed by all parties.

LOUIS NAPOLEON KILLED.

Reported Governor-General of Caucasus Is Assassinated at Tiflis.

PARIS. Oct. 15.-(I A. M.)-The Petit Caporal this morning publishes a rumor that Prince Louis Napoleon, Governor-General of Caucasus, has been assassinated at Tiffis. There is no confirmation of Napoleon is the son of Jerome Bonaparte, whose father was the Jerome Bonaparte

Turks Stop Bible Distribution.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 45.—(Special.)
Officers of the American Bible Society assert that Turks at Angora, Adrianople, Salonica and other points have again stopped the distribution of Bibles by the stopped the distribution of Bibles by the society. The officers complain that United States Minister Leishmann is not suffi-ciently active to prevent the Turks from taking this action, and that his protests to the Porte have not resulted in giving them a chance to carry out their work in

Panama Will Not Pay Colombia.

PANAMA, Oct. 14.-The government denies the report that the government will pay \$1,000,000 to Colombia's foreign bond-holders. The Associated Press is officially informed that Panama will only pay its share of the debt in proportion to the population of the isthmus at the time the independence of Panama was de-clared, and conditionally on Colombia's agreement to pay the sums borrowed from the former State of Panama treasury.

New Military Railroad in India.

LONDON, Oct. 14 .- (Special.) -- An important decision has been taken for the ex-tension of a strategic railroad toward the Afghan frontier, which there is reason to believe will follow the course of the Ka-bul River. 
