ORDERT TO A TEN-MILL LEVY-The roposition to make a 10-mill levy in St. Johns for the coming year in order to wipe out the present debt, create a fund for expenses and to erect a city hall is opponed generally, so it is said, by the property-owners. According to the As-sessor's figures the taxable valuation of property inside the city limits of St. Johns is \$1,250,000, or three times what it was last year. A 10-mill levy would raise \$12,000, enough to clear off the present debt and leave money to meet all current expenses. The debt of St. Johns, luding the purchase price of the ground secured the past week, is above \$5000, for which the city has a public dock, some fire apparatus and grounds for a hall. All of this debt is in the form of warrants bearing 6 per cent, issued by the city, confessing judgment for the claims. Part or the debt is for salaries of the officers. Warrants were want a 4-mill levy, which would not pay iff the present debt. Just what the levy be made is not apparent at this time, it is expected that the Mayor will call a meeting and get an expression of the people as to what they consider rea-sonable.
