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# Hughes Makes Talk to College Students at Brown University.

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.-In his address at the dinner of the Brown University Club last night, Charles E. Hughes, counsel to the Armstrong insurance committee, touched incidentally on the legislative in-quiry recently concluded.<sup>8</sup> Among other things he said:

"When sport cultivates the sentiment that money is the best thing, then sport is a bad thing. "When we look about us, we see that college men in the world are quite as ready to get their share of the graft as wen who have not had an education ready to get their share of the grait as men who have not had an education. Nowadays the young man comes out of college with the sole idea of 'getting on.' To do this he is willing to sacrifice his independence and his sense of honor. He will become the tool of a political leader and will put himself in a position of moral servitide to please him.

and will put nimself in a position of moral servitude to please him. "When it is made plain that they must stand on their merits, then young men will feel a spirit of emandpation. Strip fictitious reputations. Have publicity and enforce the law. Make men stand on their merits. Politics should be conducted openly.

"Leaders should be chosen for their statesmanlike qualities, for their stand-ands of honor, for their courage, not for their skill in pulling wires. And where shall we look for the liberalizing spirit, the inspiration to do good and be honest if not to the education and environment and the stimulus of college halls? "I would like to tell you of the doubt and heartaches and headaches of these

I believe that we, as college men, have great lessons to take to heart, to put success on a true basis; to learn to deny to men of money special privi-leges just because they have money; in other words, to develop the spirit of per-fect fairness and honesty."
