Several long passages have been made between European ports and the Pacific Coast, and shipping men yesterday recalled the tedious voyage of the British ship Hospodors, which in the 88 spent 18 months covering the distance from London to San Francisco. She, too, was dismasted in rounding Cape Hoyn, and put into Ancud, a small port in Chile. Finding no facilities there for repairing her rigging, her first officer made his way in one of the ship's boats to Valparaiso for assistance, and a tug was sent south to take the Hospodore in tow. The first officer's performance was looked upon as one of the most daring in the annals of maritime affairs, for he had to cover many hundreds of miles of dangerous water, with a jagged coast close at hand.


