GIVE COUNTIES A SHARE

'I Government Sells Timber Without Land, He Claims One-Fourth for County - Some Eloquent Figures.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 10.-Senator Fulton is preparing to vigorously oppose the bill soon mittee providing for the repeal of the timber and stone act, unless he can secure an amendment stipulating that 25 per cent of the money derived from the sale of public timber shall be turned over county in which the timber is sit-The bill in contemplation absolutely repeals the present law and pro poses that the Government shall retain title to all timber land, selling only ma-ture timber at public auction or otherat not less than the appraised

This in effect places all public timber never become subject to taxation, and in consequence the counties in which this land is located will be forever deprived benefit of the taxes which would eventually accrue, were this land taken up under the timber and stone act.

Wants Share for Counties.

Mr. Polton, after research in the departsents, shows that, if the pending bill secomes law, practically all of Oregon's 19,000,000 acres of timber land will be per-manently reserved. About 5,000,000 acres are already in forest reserves and nearly have been withdrawn from entry with a view to permanent reservaleaving 5,000,000 acres still subject atry, but which would be withheld entry if the pending bill were

Immense Wealth in Timber.

He has quoted official figures to show that the average stand of timber in Oregon is 12.700 feet board measure per acre ranging from 4700 feet east of the Cas cades, to an average of 17,700 feet on the west slope, in some instances reaching 40,000 feet to the acre. The Government basis of a valuation of \$1 a thousand feet, estimates Oregon's timber wealth to be \$213,000,000, but Mr. Fulton this estimate can be safely

Better Return From Farming. Assuming, for the sake of argument,

Smathers Accused of Doping Lou Dillon.

GREAT TURF CONSPIRACY

Millionaire Horseman Charged With Winning Memphis Gold Cup by Fraud and Ruining Great Trotter for Life.

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.-The American

The most sensational turf scandal of recent years was revealed last night when it became known that E. E. Smathers, the millionaire horsesses. the millionaire horseman, had been accused of knowing that drugs had been administered to Lou Dillion, C. K. G. Billings' famous trotter, when, at Memphis, in October, 1904, Smathers, driving his own horse, Major Delmar, beat Lou Italian.

Dillon.

The gold cup, worth \$3000, which Smathers won at that time, has been taken by a Deputy Sheriff out of his suite in the Pierpont and is now in the Sheriff office. Mr. Smathers last night said the cup had been seized before he learned of the startling accusations.

Makes Smathers Furious.

On Wednesday, while Mr. Smathers was out of town, Deputy Sheriff John Murray went to the Pierpont and, after demand-ing admittance, showed the clerk a writ of replevin for the cup, which was surof replevin for the cup, which was sur-rendered. Mr. Smathers returned to his apartments yesterday and, on learning of the seizure of the cup, was furious. An attorney was at once retained, and it was found that only a few hours of the three days allowed by law remained in which he might deposit a bond for the cup, indi-cating that he would fight the writ. He hurried to the Sheriff's office and deposited a bond for \$7000.

Smathers' Side of Case.

Mr. Smathers sent his lawyer down to the attorneys who procured the writ. There he learned that the proceedings had been begun by Murray Howe, the secretary of the Memphis Racing Association. who had supervision over the meeting at which Major Delmar beat Lou Dilion in two straight heats. Attached to the com-plaint were affidavits made by two men named Speer and Saunders, their first names not being given. Mr. Smathers said

"I have learned that the accusation on which Howe seeks to get the cup away from me is that I knew Lou Dillon had been drugged when I drove Major Del-mar past him in that race. They allege that I am familiar with what took place prior to the race. If dope was used on Lou Dillon, I had no hand in it and know nothing about it. Lou Dillon was a favorite in the race and she should not have been, if any one knew she had been doped. These men are incriminating themsives and practically are ruling them-selves off the turf, for they never will be
