To those, who can relish Shakespeare his presence is bound to seek them out early in life and hold them fast. Now to the point: Is any stage suitable to the representation of thuse great characters other than the stage of fancy? Or., Feb. 11.—(special.)—A big mass meeting was held this afternoon in the opera-house to take action on the proposal to divide wasco County with a county seat at Hood River. Judge Henderson was made chairman of the meeting and Councilman McDonald secretary. The meeting was unanimously in favor of county division and indersed A. A. Jayne for nomination for Representa-Jayne for nomination for Representa-tive to present the bill, if elected.
Two proposals were before the meet-ing looking to the creation of the new county. One is that the boundary line be put between Mosier and The Dalles, and the other that it be placed this side of The Dalles and extended down to the Big Sandy River in Multnomah County, provided the matter could be
