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SUICIDE OF UNKNOWN MAN

Body Found Hanging by Neck to Rafter in Shack.

A body of an unknown man about 37 or 38 years of age was found hanging by a rope to a rafter in an old shack two miles below Linnton by P. B. Noyes, proprietor of the Linnton Box Factory, and W. R. Stiltz yesterday afternoon. The men were notified by a couple of tramps that there was a dead man at a shack near the railroad tracks, and they went to the scene to investigate.

The body was found hanging to the rafter with the legs drawn up, and the man had evidently been dead for some time. All the evidence points to suicide, for the unfortunate man had secured a rope and, making one end fast to the caft-er, secured a block, of wood about 14 inches high, on which he stood. Making the other end fast around his neck, be kicked the perch away and, drawing up his knees, slowly strangled to death. Not a paper was found on the person to indicate his identity or whence he came. Some charred papers were found in the remains of a fire that had been kindled near the hut, which indicates that the man de-stroyed all his effects before committing suicide. Coroner Finley was sent for and took charge of the remains.

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


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
