Disgruntled White Employes Threaten Asiatics With Dynamite.

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., March 24.-(Special.)-A special to the Californian from Kernville relates that Wednesday nine Japanese, employes of the Edison Electric Company, were run out of the town by a gang of transient laborers, under threats of being blown up with dynamite. A part of the camp utensiis were destroyed, the tent was carried away and the Japanese were ordered to leave. They started for the railroad, 49 miles distant, and are now at Callente, awaiting instructions from the company.

The Japanese were employed to do th preliminary work of constructing a third power plant for the company on the Kern River. Their presence aroused the tre of a number of former employes of the Edi-son and Kern River Companies, and these men, whose names are not known, agreed that the Japanese must go. The visit to the camp followed, but no force was found necessary to send the Asiatics hur-rying to the railroad.
