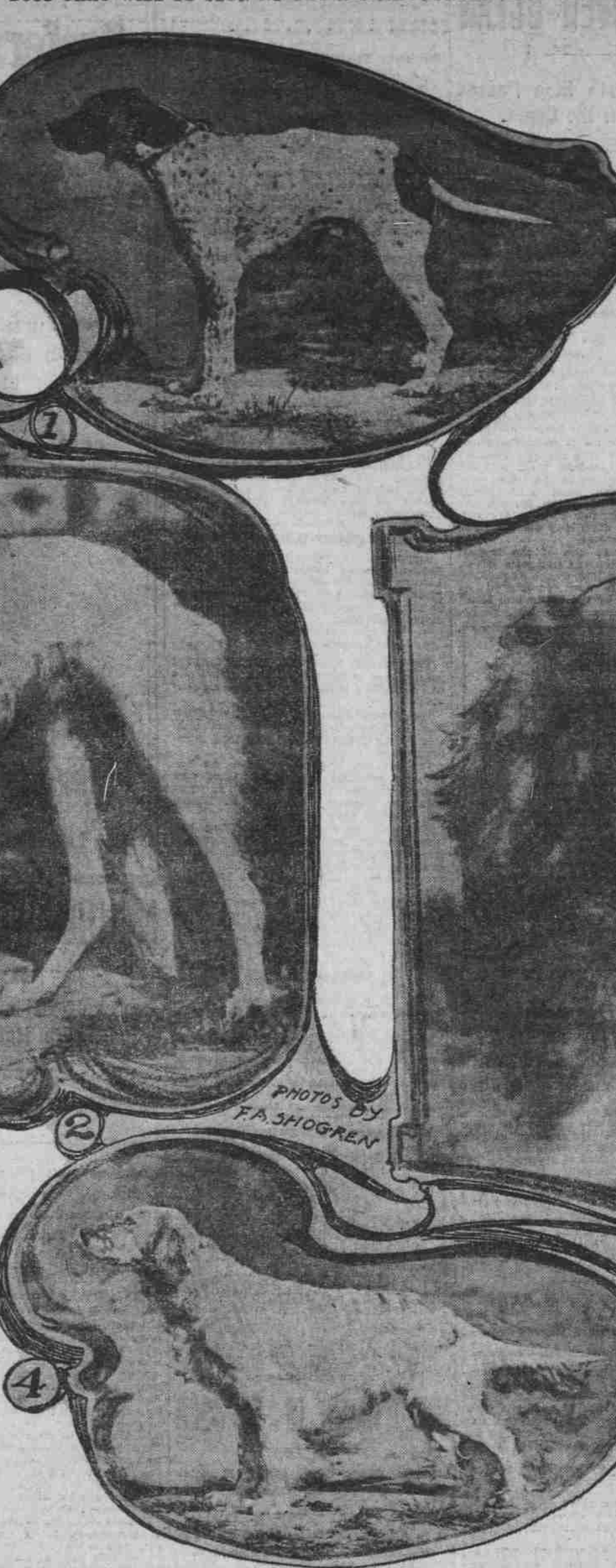

DOGS THAT WILL BE SEEN AT THE ANNUAL KENNEL CLUB SHOW

Portland Kennel Club Makes Arrangements.

FINE DOGS WILL BE THERE

Organization Hopes to Make Its Seventh Exhibit the Best Ever

Held in the City of Portland.

The Portland Kennel Club, Inc., will hold its seventh annual bench show May 20 to June 2, inclusive, next, at the Exposition, building in the skating rink hall. The hall has been considerably improved and enlarged since the club held its show there last year, and this will make the location all the more desirable for the dog show.

The Portland Kennel Club was organized by a number of canine fanciers in January, 1900, and its first show was held in the old Cyclopaedia building, on Third street, and E. T. Payne, of San Francisco, judged the first show, which was a success in every way, and the young organization was put on its feet financially and otherwise.

The first board of officers were: W. F. Burrell, president; F. V. Holman, vice-president; R. Lea Barnes, treasurer; James A. Taylor, secretary, and Dr. E. C. Cuthbert, W. W. Peaslee and T. J. A. Tiedeman, trustees.

First Show Held Here.

The first show was held under the old Pacific Kennel League rules, and this organization eventually gave way to the Western Kennel League, which was abandoned two years ago, and at which time the Portland Kennel Club joined the National organization, the American Kennel Club, and now a winning made at the Portland show is recognized all over the United States and placed on record in the A. K. C. stud book, which is a great advantage to the owners of all thoroughbred dogs.

The first show had a few good dogs in it and a number of poor ones, but it served well its purpose, and since that time the dog-loving public has had the

privilege of seeing some of the finest dogs of various breeds in America exhibited at the local show, and the dog owners and fanciers have been educated to know what a good dog should be.

A show has been held, with success, each year in the Spring, since 1900, and much good has been accomplished for man's best friend, the dog.

The Portland Kennel Club was recently incorporated, and the present board of officers are: J. Wesley Ladd, president; Dr. James C. Zah, vice-president; Henry Ladd Corbett, treasurer; Frank B. Watkins, secretary, and Walter B. Honeyman, W. R. Fochheimer and Henry Berger, Jr., trustees.

The present directors have worked hard all Spring for the success of the coming show, and have secured about 90 silver cups to be given as special prizes. The club's regular silver and bronze medals will be given for first and second prizes, respectively, and these medals are of a handsome new design and well worth winning.

The show this year will probably have a rating of three points towards the championship in the American Kennel Club, ten points being necessary to secure a championship.

Two Judges Selected.

The club has secured the services of two excellent judges for this year's event—Major J. M. Taylor, of New York, will judge all classes except terriers and collies, which will be adjudicated upon by John Bradshaw, of San Francisco. Major Taylor judged at the great New York show this Winter, and is recognized as one of the leading judges of this country, and Mr. Bradshaw, who will pass upon his special breeds, terriers and collies, is second to none in these classes, and is recognized as the leading Western judge. Thus, the dogowners will have the services of two of America's best professional judges, and those who exhibit good specimens will be duly rewarded, while those whose dogs are not quite up to the necessary standard to win, will have their pet's defects pointed out, and this will enable them to get a better animal when next they get a dog.

The club desires to foster and stimulate the interest in thoroughbred dogs, and by doing this, the noisy street mongrel will disappear from our city and the handsome and intelligent thoroughbred will take his place.

This can only be done with the hearty co-operation of all dog owners and lovers in the city, and the directors are especially anxious to have their support at the coming show. Put your dog in the show and help out, and if you do not win this year, come back next year with a winner.

Kennels and Clubhouse.

The members of the Portland Kennel Club hope to own, in the not far distant future, their own kennels and clubhouse, and when they are enabled to do this

the cause of the good dog will be materially advanced.

Without dog shows, the dog would soon degenerate, the different breeds intermix and the city would be filled up with a lot of worthless, ugly mongrels, whose chief characteristic is uselessness.

Dog shows help to develop and improve those characteristics which are so beautifully set forth in the lines of the well-known poem by Byron:

"The poor dog, in life the firmest friend, The first to welcome, foremost to defend, Whose honest heart is still his master's own."

Who labors, fights, lives, breathes for him alone.

The interest in dog shows has grown apace the last few years, until now thousands of dollars are annually spent in the importing and breeding of pure-bred dogs of all breeds, in this country, and this condition at present exists on the Pacific Coast, where it is estimated that the annual expenditure for blue-blooded dogs is \$10,000.

Ashton Is Surprised.

Thomas Ashton, the famous English judge, who judged the Portland and San Francisco shows last year, said that the dogs on the Pacific Coast were a pleasant surprise to him, and that he compared favorably in many instances with the best Eastern dogs, and many of these fine dogs will be on exhibition at the Portland show. OUTSIDERS MAY NOT TAKE PART

No Longer Can They Compete Under the Colors of Multnomah.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS ACTS

W. H. Chapin Explains That Track Athletics Are Not to Be Forsaken, but Members Only Are to Take Part.

By its action in refusing to allow athletes who are not bona fide members of the Multnomah Amateur Athletic Club to represent that organization in regular contests, the board of directors of the club hopes to put a stop to the practice that has long been in vogue, of securing outsiders to uphold the honors of the scarlet and white. Many contests in the past on field, gridiron and diamond have been made notable by the number of men wearing the winged M who were not really members of the athletic club, and whose sole purpose in participating in the events was the trip they secured to Portland and the attendant newspaper notoriety.

Action by Directors.

The action referred to was taken at meeting of the directors held on Monday last, and through some misunderstanding it was at first supposed that the directors had withdrawn all support from field and track events. Managers Watkins, of the track team, is reported to have sent in his resignation to the board, and it is said he indulged in very caustic comments on those who, he believed, were placing hindrances in the club's march of athletic progress. Other members of the club were no less outspoken in their condemnation of the board's action, and openly expressed their views.

On the following day W. H. Chapin cleared the atmosphere a little with the announcement that the new rules of the club were directed principally against the trafficking in outside men, who were induced to come and play for the club, to the detriment of the club members themselves.

W. H. Chapin's Statement.

In the course of his remarks he said in part:

"We are not opposed to amateur sport. We are always ready to encourage it, but we have concluded to stop this trafficking in outside men merely to help us win games or contests. The rush to colleges and universities to get a lot of fellows who have no connection with the club for the purpose of having a strong track team has been prevalent, and there is also the same evil in connection with baseball. It smacks too much of professionalism to be on the same basis."

"We might as well make a stand now. There are lots of young fellows belonging to the secondary schools of the city who are anxious to play in the club and are entitled to a chance. It is not right to our own members who may want an opportunity to work. All of us feel that we are to have an amateur club, we must have clean athletics. We have gradually worked into this other business and now is the time to stop. Tennis is a clean sport, and why should not other departments be on the same basis?"

Must Be Bona Fide Member.

The board has not forbidden the Spokane trip for the track team. He will send a team to it if it is composed of bona fide club members and will pay for a trainer several weeks before the meet. But we will not pay to outside athletes."

The conditions referred to by Mr. Chapin have existed for a long time, and have never resulted in any material gain for the club, except the temporary victory over the opposing teams. The list of outsiders is a long one, and includes many names prominent in Northwest athletic circles.

Notable among the outsiders who have worn the scarlet and white is Dick Smith, All-American halfback. Smith was attending the University of Oregon in 1900, when he was prevailed upon to line up with Multnomah against Stanford.

Rube Saunders, of Chemaw, played on the Multnomah football team regularly for several years. He has also been a member of the track team, and represented the club on many occasions. He has never been a bona fide resident of Portland, except for a few days in the summer, and is considered an outsider.

Chauncey Bishop lived in Portland one year when he played on the football team, 1902. However, in 1905 he lived in Salem, and came to Portland to play in the scheduled games. It has always been understood that in such cases as this, and in others where out-of-town athletes participated, their expenses were paid to and from Portland and their homes.

Seth Kerron and Frank Templeton played on Multnomah's football team last year's day, against Seattle. They have always been considered University of Oregon men, and not members of the club. Another out-of-town man who played on last year's football team was Roosevelt, of the University of Idaho.

Track List Even Larger.

The list assumes larger proportions in track and field events. It includes men who have been imported during the past
