

PIONEERS WILL HOLD REUNION

Plan for Celebration, Which Will Take Place in the Armory.

AN ALL-DAY CELEBRATION

Banquet Will Be Served to the Early Settlers, Who Made Their Homes in the Oregon Country.

As the grand encampment of the Indian war veterans and the annual reunion of the Oregon pioneers draw near, deep interest is manifested in the plans for those days. June 12 will see the veteran soldiers assembled at the White Temple, and the next day, Thursday, June 14, the pioneers will gather at the Armory for an all-day celebration.

Programme for Pioneers.

The programme for the pioneers follows: Thursday, June 14—From 1 to 2 P. M., the pioneers will assemble at the Armory, corner of Tenth and Couch streets, clothed with the proper Pioneer badge for 1866. Upon arrival at the Armory they will be received by Joseph Buchtel, grand marshal, and his aides, assisted by the woman's reception committee, and conducted to the dance hall on the second floor, where the exercises of the hour will take place according to the following programme: Calling to order by President John W. Minto, 185, Portland.

Will Hold Social Reunion.

At the close of these exercises there will be a social reunion until 4 o'clock, when Grand Marshal Buchtel and his aides will form a column of two, beginning with the earliest pioneers, and march to the banquet-room, where they will be received by Mrs. C. M. Cartwright, chairman of the Woman's Auxiliary, assisted by the Pioneer's Woman's Reception Committee, which will conduct them to the tables, where, after all are seated, the feast will begin.

Evening Session.

At 7:30 the annual business meet, with John W. Minto, president, in the chair, will be held in the dance hall, officers for the ensuing year elected, a list of the members of the association, who have died during the year and the report of the committee on resolutions read, and any other business transacted which may be necessary.

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Summer School at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 9.—(Special.)—Under the direction of Professor P. Hough and DeGarriss Reeves, of the High School, it has been arranged to start a Summer school for teachers. The purpose of the school is to help teachers and prospective teachers to gain a greater degree
