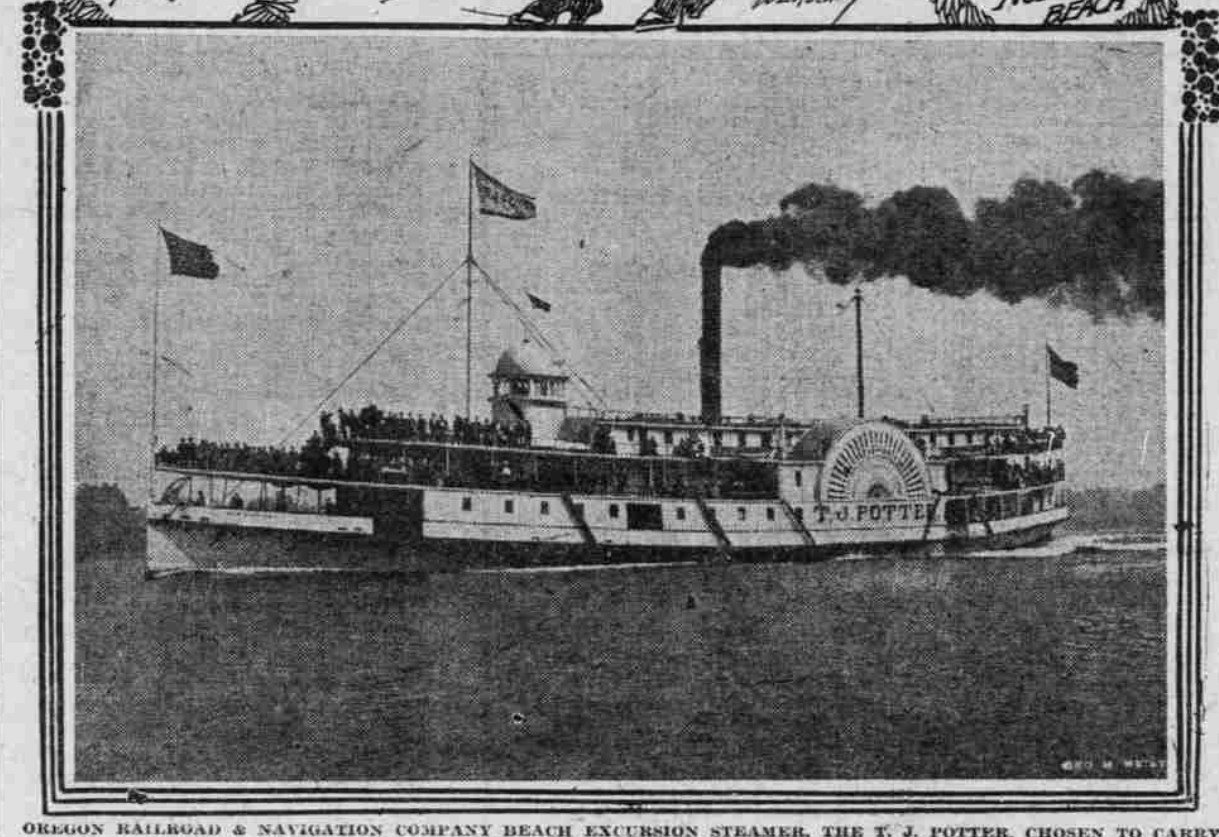
Trips to North Beach.
