Burlington, Sullivan County, N. Y. June 20.—Dear Friend Ballard: I will be surprised to hear from me, but as my time in this life may end at any time, naturally I am thinking of writing you with its pleasures and heartaches, but it all seems pleasures to me now.

As you may know, I am up in the mountains, battling with a case of tuberculosis, and I'm going to try and win the fight, for I have so much to live for, though I never really appreciated life so much as now. I contracted the disease in New York, while holding the post as managing editor of the new evening paper, The Broadway News. I conceived the idea of its origin and organized and promoted it, always wishing for you to be my partner. Well, I got into it, and it has been a good staff, "yours truly" working harder

than ever before. It was one continuous grind night and day. I fairly lived at the office, where some men were employed, in my enthusiasm, I forgot about myself and had a general collapse, followed by two hemorrhages. I was at once ordered to bed. It almost broke my heart to leave that enterprise, for I was on the right road to success and everything running finely. I loved the work, for which you had helped prepare me.

My wife was ever with me, encouraging me, as she is now, loyal and a little soldier. If I live, it shall be for her; she is constantly with me and caring for me, and we are going on our feet so nicely, and we are beginning to plan a trip to dear old Portland, but just what the outcome will be, we hope to see you all again.

Four doctors say I can be cured. However, I am resolved to my fate, and if I never see you again I want you to know that I think of you kindly, and I hope you likewise of me, though circumstances tried to separate us for a time. Even at the time when we seemed to oppose each other, down deep in my heart

I wished you success. However, perhaps we may have a good laugh over it some day. You and I shall always be friends, because I think we understand each other. We are at the "old homestead," and it's beautiful and wild. We live mostly outdoors and "subside" milk and raw eggs. Louise is in excellent health and is singing, trying to outdo the birds. I have gained 20 pounds since my break-down. I have most of the copies of The Guide and Town Topics, and they are so interesting to me.

Well, Louise says I must not write too long, but more often, as it is quite a tax for me.

Give my regards to any inquiring friends and if you ever see a copy of The Broadway News just remember that indirectly you are quite responsible for its existence. It is now a flourishing New York daily.
