How Catholic Societies Will Celebrate.

MAMMOTH PICNIC PLANNED

Orphanages of Oregon Will Benefit From the Proceeds of the Entertainment to Be Given on Exposition Grounds.

Independence day will witness many patriotic celebrations and good times, but the mammoth picnic which has been arranged for the benefit of the Catholic orphanages of Oregon promises to eclipse any other both in size and interest. Through the courtesy of Lato Pence, the Government building at the Exposition grounds and the attractive island on which it stands have been put at the disposal of the Catholic clergy and the sisterhoods which have the orphanage in charge. These ample grounds are considered the most slightly and desirable picnic site around Portland, and hundreds of boys and girls and many times that number of elders are anticipating the happiest day of the summer next Wednesday. The thing which will be winding its way toward the Exposition grounds early Wednesday morning will remind Portlanders of fair days, and the good times which will be enjoyed will quite equal those of 1905.

In Behalf of Charities.

A pleasant feature of a picnic of this kind is the knowledge that every nickel spent for enjoyment during the day will be devoted to a most worthy purpose. The Catholic Diocese of Oregon has become justly famous for its philanthropic institutions and in caring for the homeless and orphaned children of its faith it is especially active. The St. Agnes' Baby Home, at Parkplace, conducted by the Sisters of Mercy; the St. Mary's Home for Girls, at St. Paul, conducted by the Sisters of the Holy Name, and the St. Mary's Home for Boys, near Beaverton, under charge of Rev. J. D. Murphy, are the institutions which will be benefited by the proceeds of this picnic, and this alone, aside from the many attractions offered for enjoyment, will doubtless attract a large crowd.

Various committees in charge of the big Fourth of July celebration have been working for two months in arranging a programme, and it is announced that there will be such a variety of entertainment that every one will be entertained. A lively ticket-selling contest has been going on among young ladies from various parishes, the winner to be awarded a fine piano by White Piano Company. At the picnic there will be shooting galleries, nigger babies, pounding bags, Japanese bowling boards and many other features.

Fine Programme Promised.

There will be plenty of good things to eat and drink on sale by the ladies of the parish and sufficient benches will be provided for the weary. There will be fine music all day by a popular band, and nothing will be missing to make this the biggest event of the day, both from a patriotic and charitable standpoint. The programme, which begins at 11 A. M. sharp, is sufficient guarantee of the success of the day, and will be given on the grounds, as the Government building is as commodious as a picnic ground itself.

Scenic Beauties of The Oaks as Seen at Night.

CHARMS OF GREAT RESORT

Some of the Attractive Features Which Draw the Crowds to This Beautiful Pleasure Ground by River.

The Oaks is now one of the most stupendous and costly amusement resorts ever promoted in the country. In its plan, its scope and the magnitude of its amusements. It has been constructed at a cost of nearly \$500,000. This season it can be said to be an architectural triumph.
At night it presents a scene of fairyland, all the buildings and surroundings being pure white and illuminated with over 50,000 electric lights. When Mr. Fred S. Of course there is everything to satisfy the lovers of harmless games. There is a modern popcorn booth that turns out popcorn by machine at an average of a thousand packages an hour, and is as attractive as was the incubator at the late fair. There is a Gypsy Camp, many Japanese ball and other clever games, the Mexican glassblowers, the "Hi Ki" ball game, a large magnetic fish pond, the laying hen game, at which when you strike the hen you get a hard-boiled egg free of charge. One of the novelties is the "Zig-Zag," where you slide 50 feet, and hope to climb a golden stairs, but few succeed. Everybody in Portland is familiar with the beautiful Tavern, conducted by Leighton & Barnes, expert caterers, and the cozy ice cream parlors, managed by Melster & Hasenmayer, late of the Royal Bakery, both of which places are charmingly situated. 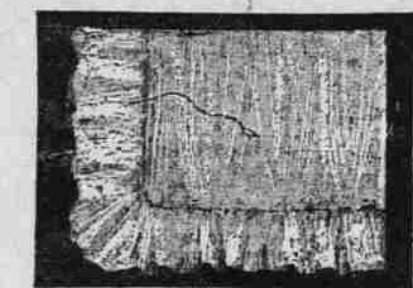
