EARLY CAR TO VANCOUVER.—Mr. F. I. Fuller, vice-president of the Portland Railway Company, announces that the first car for Vancouver on Sunday mornings will leave Portland hereafter at 7 A. M. instead of 7:40, as heretofore. This will enable Portland people to make close connection with the train for Kamama, which leaves Vancouver on Sunday mornings at 8 o'clock. The new service will also prove a great accommodation to the Vancouver people in facilitating the early delivery of The Oregonian to the subscribers at Vancouver.
