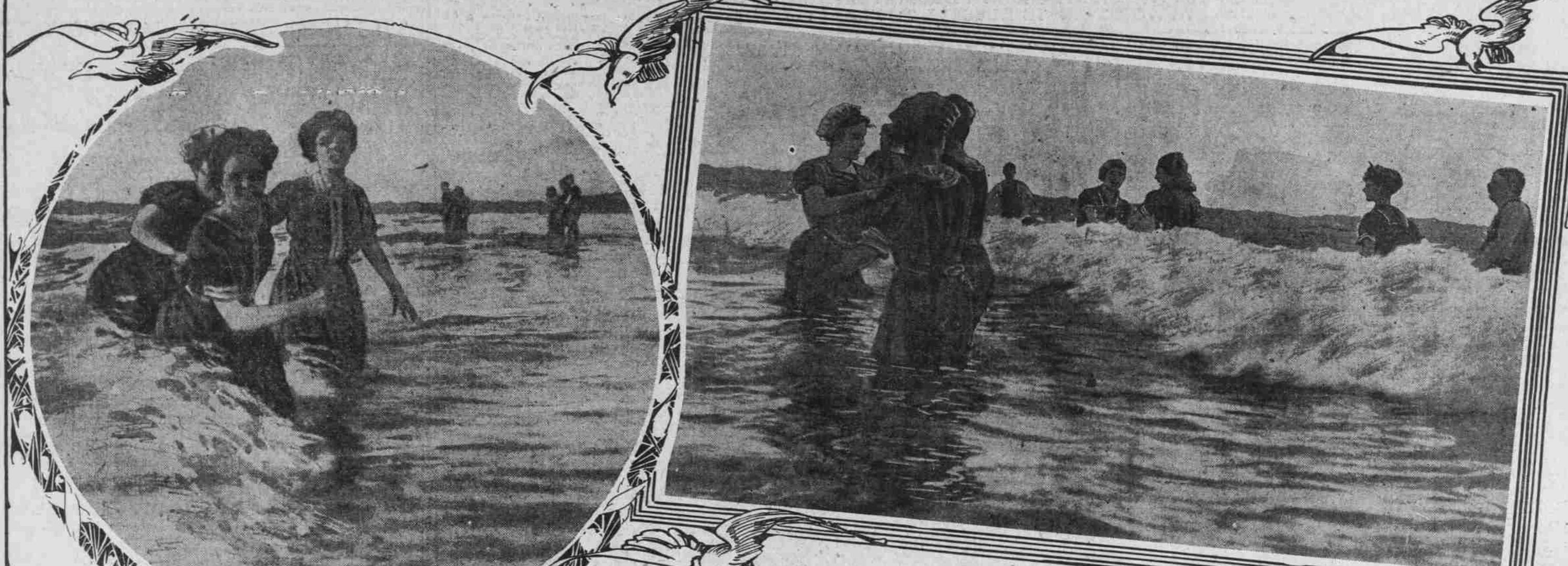


# SEASIDE SEASON PRACTICALLY ENDS WITH THE ADVENT OF SEPTEMBER

SEASIDE, Or., Sept. 1.—The arrival of September sees the crowd at the resorts along Clatsop Beach rapidly thinning out and it is probable that another week will make the Summer season once more a thing of the past. Children are to be equipped and made ready for school. Winter supplies must be laid in at home, and the many families who for the past two months have been quietly rusticated at the seashore find themselves as anxious to return to city life with its variety of diversion and its regular responsibilities as they were to escape to the land of cool and quiet some weeks ago. The hotels are still comfortably filled with transients, but are, with each departing trait, losing regular boarders who were conspicuous figures in Summer society, and these cannot be replaced this year. The weather is ideal and will remain so for some time to come, but every one is full of plans and hopes for the approaching Autumn, and one by one the cottages in the grove are donning their Winter coverings of window boards and chimney caps, and a deserted appearance is settling down upon the village.

Schemes for various public improvements for next season are forming and some of them will probably assume definite shape before the Winter is over and the crowds arrive next year.
