REVIEWS EARLY HORTICULTURE .-- One of REVIEWS EARLY HORTICULTURE.-Olde of the most interesting papers published in the last quarterly of the Oregon Histor-ical Society is that of Dr. J. R. Card-well on "The First Fruits of the Land." or a brief history of early horticulture in

Oregon. There is no one in Oregon, per-haps, so well fitted to give a history of the state's horticulture, and Dr. Card-well has not disappointed his readers in the complete paper he has prepared. He first reviews the great variety of native wild fruit found here by the ploneer set-tiers, giving valuable details concerning tiors, giving valuable details concerning the wild crabapple, plum, cherries, elder, grape, blackberry, raspberry, strawberry, currant, gooseberry, cranberry, barberry, salal, June berry, haw, and various nuts. The unusual size of the cultivated fruits in the early '20s and '60s is also com-mented upon as indicative of the wonder-but set upon d finates of the wonderful soil and climate of this section. He adds a concise and thorough history of the various horticultural organizations of the various horticultural organizations of the state, he having been president of the Oregon Horticultural Society. No man in Oregon has taken a deeper interest in the development of the orchards of the state than Dr. Cardwell, and the high character of fruit for which this section is noted today is in a great measure due to his personal efforts in inciting a spirit of advancement and pride among the or-chardists.
