

WILL COMMEND FAIR AT SEATTLE

President Promises Indorsement in Message to Congress.

URGES NO APPROPRIATION

Dr. Coe Obtains Cheering Words for People of Northwest—Governor Hoggatt Rebutted for Breach of Official Etiquette.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Oct. 27.—Dr. H. W. Coe of Portland had a long conference with the President today at the request of the managers of the Seattle-Alaska-Yukon Exposition, and was assured that the President in his forthcoming message to Congress will favorably mention the enterprise in about the same manner that he mentioned the Lewis and Clark Exposition. He will not, however, urge any Congressional appropriation.

Speaking to Dr. Coe about the exposition, the President said he felt it would prove an entire success, for he knew the spirit and enterprise of the people of the Northwest and had confidence that they would make good.

At the time the Exposition Board was being formed, many Governors were invited to become members, including the Governor of Alaska and the Governor of Yukon Territory. Both accepted. It now develops that the Governor of Yukon Territory was invited directly by the Seattle people and not through the State Department, as should have been done, inasmuch as he is an official of a foreign government. Secretary Hitchcock, learning of this, has written Governor Hoggatt, saying he must withdraw from the board or relinquish the Governorship of Alaska.

Steps are being taken to have an invitation extended to the Governor of Yukon through official channels and when this is done, there will be no further objection to Mr. Hoggatt's serving on the board.

EACH HAS JOB FOR BARRETT

President and Root Can't Agree Where to Put Him.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Oct. 27.—John Barrett's fate is still in doubt. Whether he is to be appointed Ambassador to Brazil or chosen Director of the Bureau of American Republics is the problem that still confronts President Roosevelt and Secretary Root. The President would like to send Mr. Barrett to Rio Janeiro, for he is well pleased with Mr. Barrett's work in Colombia and thinks he has earned promotion. On the other hand, while admitting his competency to fill the Brazilian post, Mr. Root has great hopes of rehabilitating the Bureau of American Republics in a manner that will build up closer and more friendly relations with the republics of Central and South America, and it is his conviction that Mr. Barrett is better equipped to undertake this work than any other man in the diplomatic service.

As the office of Director is not filled by appointment, but by election of the representatives of all the republics represented, Mr. Root does not want to presume to dictate to them whom they shall choose. It is reported on excellent authority that each of the republics represented in the bureau has a preference for Barrett, and it is said that, if this Government is willing, his election will follow as a matter of course.

Meanwhile the President and Mr. Root are unable to agree and it is not yet known where Mr. Barrett will go. What ever promotion he gets will be solely on merit, as he has absolutely no political backing.

Report on Oregon Building Sites.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Oct. 27.—A. F. Statter, private secretary to Secretary Shaw, returned to Washington today after inspecting the public building sites at Eugene, Clatskanie and Bellingham. His report will not be made public for 30 days in order that the owners of the various sites offered may be heard before a selection is made.

Will Be Biggest of Drydocks.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Oct. 27.—The Navy Department is working on plans for the new drydock for the Puget Sound navy-yard. The dimensions have not been determined, but it is said that the dock will accommodate the largest warships likely to be constructed within the next 40 years.

PENNSY'S FAST RELAY TEAM

Quartet Expected to Make New Record for Mile.

The University of Pennsylvania expects to have one of the fastest mile relay teams ever seen on a cinder path this year in the relay races. Not only do the performances in the past of the athletes who compose the squad appear to endow the record made on Franklin Field by Shrick, Rust, Willis and Lightner of Harvard, three years ago, but the world's record may be wiped off the boards by this quartet of flyers.

Four of the men who have an excellent chance for this great team are residents of Philadelphia, and products of the Philadelphia schools. The other is from Kentucky and is an intercollegiate champion.

Captain Whitman, of the track team, who ran second in the college sprint championships, is one of the best quarter-milers in America. He ran the first relay for Penn last season, and though it was his first trial at the distance and he was meeting a field of stars, he led the field at the line. He beat 50 seconds last season, and he may go under 40, as he is stronger and faster.

N. J. Cartmell, the intercollegiate champion in the sprints, is a resident of Kentucky. He is regarded by experts to be the fastest man in America and to be the successor of Walters, Tewksbury and Duffy. Last season he took the third position on the red and blue relay team. Cartmell has done 9 2-5 in trials, and ran

this fast in the race last year. He is the best-proportioned athlete of the university and stands well in his classes.

John B. Taylor holds the college record for the two-furlong event and there has been nothing shown in years his equal. Jim Robinson, the former Princeton coach, once said that Taylor was the fastest thing at this distance since the creation of the earth. He has not lost a race since he entered college, and Mike Murphy predicts that he will make a new world's record before he is much older. He is a sophomore in the veterinary school, and a resident of Philadelphia.

Ed Bonasus, a Philadelphia, who comes from the Lancy and Haverford, was a member of the Penn team last year, and ran the last quarter in the championship race. The best men in the college second went after him, but he led them to the tape and did not falter, though he had gone the two furlongs in 49 1-4 seconds. It was one of the most sensational performances ever seen on any track by a freshman quarter-miler. With the experience gained by him last year he should rank second only to Taylor.

BONI AFRAID OF PUBLICITY

WANTS DIVORCE CASE ARGUED BEHIND CLOSED DOORS.

Countess of Castellane Plans to Expose Unsavory Character of Her Titled Spouse.

PARIS, Oct. 27.—(Special.)—Lawyers in the case of Count Boni de Castellane and the Countess, who was Miss Anna Gould, are prepared to plead their case Wednesday in the action of the Countess for divorce from Count Boni. It is understood that the lawyers for the Count desire to have the essential facts in the case suppressed, while the Gould family are said to favor entire publicity in the matter. The Castellanes are said to desire an inquiry to be heard behind closed doors and only the verdict given to the public.

Lawyers for the Countess have prepared a strong case, based upon Count Boni's infidelity, extravagance and incompetency, and hope to win a divorce and the custody of the children for the Countess. Count Boni has threatened to present facts prejudicial to his wife if present attacks upon him are persisted in, but is willing to yield her a verdict if he is not dealt with too severely in a financial settlement.

Count Boni does not seem at all crestfallen at the approaching trial of the case, and goes about with a care-free air. The Countess has been giving parties and entertainments to friends at the Chateau du Morice. While she avers a reconciliation is impossible, she does not feel harshly toward the father of her children.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 27.—(Special.)—A man believed to be C. L. Pearce was beaten and robbed by footpads on the Park boulevard some time this morning, and was found in a dying condition on the road by two men who happened to be passing that way. The unfortunate man's pockets had been rifled, he had been struck over the head several times, and it was evident that his assailants had left him in the road believing him to be dead. The Park Emergency Hospital was notified and the victim removed there. Later he was taken to the Central Emergency Hospital, where he died this day. Contract Work Found Cheaper.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—After February 1 next the American Bank Note Company will manufacture all United States postage stamps. Under a contract the company must deliver 25,000,000 stamps daily six times a week. The American Bank Note Company made the first postage stamps for the government, and held the contract up to 18 years ago. At that time the government went into the business itself, and down to this day the Bureau of Printing and Engraving has turned out all the stamps. It is declared the government has decided that the work can be done cheaper by contract.

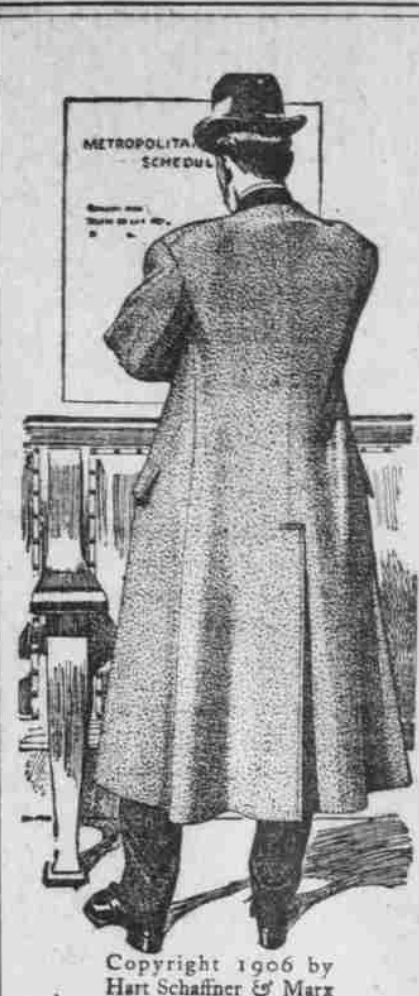
