

RESPIRE IS GIVEN ROADS BY UNIONS

Engineers and Firemen Will
Make Peace Before Mak-
ing Demands.

ALL-DAY MEETING FAILS

Granting of Employees' Demands
Would Drive Some to Verge of
Bankruptcy—Strike Would
Involve 1,500,000 Men.

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—(Special.)—A respite has been given the heads of railroads throughout the country by the apparent failure of the representatives of the two big railway unions to agree on terms of jurisdictional amity.

Before the sweeping demands for an advance in wages and a universal eight-hour day are presented to the railroad managers a factional quarrel between the firemen and engineers will have to be settled. A committee, composed of A. H. Garretson, of the Conductors; J. J. Hanrahan, of the Firemen & Engineers; H. H. Morrissey, of the Trainmen; and W. S. Stone, of the Engineers, which has been in constant secret session at the Sherman House since yesterday morning, dissolved today, without action being taken to settle the existing strike on the Southern Pacific, which was caused by the troubles of the Firemen & Engineers' Union.

Try to Present Solid Front.

To present a solid front to the employers when the demands are made for the wholesale increase in wages, it has been decided best, it is said, to eliminate all friction among the ranks of the employees. Also, it is declared, the ultimate action will be deferred until the present controversy between locomotive engineers and road managers has been settled. Then the cry will be, so it is declared, "At them all together!"

Mr. Morrissey and Mr. Garretson, who have been fermenting the situation, departed for Cleveland tonight, but will meet in Chicago again when the locomotive engineers and the road managers are at peace.

As to the particulars of the demands made on the railroads all the members of the conference are reticent. It has been ascertained, however, that all the roads of the country, and also Canada and Mexico will be included when the demands are made.

May Bankrupt Some Roads.

Mr. Morrissey and Mr. Garretson both reiterated the statement that no question of a universal strike obtruded itself at the present time, and also declared their belief that strike measures would not be resorted to, whatever the decision of the railroads.

Meanwhile presidents and traffic managers of the roads centering in Chicago have been holding secret sessions for the last two weeks. It has been admitted that granting the demands of the employees for an increase of from 5 to 20 per cent in wages would sweep some of the railroads dangerously near to receivership.

Involves 1,500,000 Men.

If, as it has been declared, the entire force of railroad employees in the United States should join in the demand for increased wages, it is computed that 1,500,000 men would be affected. Nearly 8,000,000 men, women and children are dependent on these men for their living.

There are 108 roads in the United States. Of these 30 are great systems owned by comparatively few men. The total mileage is 25,000. More than \$500,000,000 is paid out annually in wages and salaries.

Of the employees who are the more active in the demand for greater wages are the firemen, who number 35,000; engineers, 25,000; conductors, 41,854; and trainmen, 112,388.

No More Harriman Lines Involved.

Mr. Hanrahan stated that none of the Harriman lines other than the Southern Pacific Sunset Route will be involved in the firemen's controversy, at least for the present. He admitted, however, that he had shifted his headquarters from Peoria to Chicago for the purpose of handling a strike more effectively should such a condition develop. Mr. Hanrahan also declared that the situation is one of the most delicate which has confronted the organized railway employees of the country in many years; that it really constitutes a crisis in the history of the brotherhoods. A single move on the part of the firemen to spread the present strike, he said, almost certain to involve engineers, trainmen and conductors all over the West.

CALLS YOUNG AN EX-CONVICT

Ex-Prisoner Identifies Accuser of
Stugging Teamsters.

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—Assistant State's Attorney Miller declared today at the commencement of the Shea trial that he would advise a number of merchants who were yesterday subpoenaed by the defense to ignore the subpoena. No action was taken regarding the subpoena and the matter was allowed to go over until Monday.

The defense then placed on the stand John Waters, who testified that he, while confined in the penitentiary, knew Albert Young, who turned state's evidence early in the trial. He declared Young was a convict also.

Texas Road Grants Advance.

EL PASO, Tex., Jan. 5.—The Southwestern Railroad, a Phillips-Dodge corporation, has granted an increase in wages to about 30 men in its train service amounting to 10 to 20 per cent.

Hoch Offers to Mediate.

TOPEKA, Kan., Jan. 5.—Governor Hoch, in letters written today to E. H. Hanrahan, president of the Union Pacific Railroad Company, and to J. J. Hanrahan, grand master of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, offers to become a mediator and arbitrator between the officials of

the Southern Pacific Railway and the engineers of the system to settle the threatened strike along the Southern Pacific lines.

FIREMEN READY FOR STRIKE

Members of Union Only Awaiting
Order From Headquarters.

The members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen employed on the Harriman lines in the Northwest have not as yet been advised to walk out, but they declare they are all ready to strike when they receive word. It is believed that if the signal is received they will come suddenly with no previous intimation other than has already been given.

General Manager O'Brien, of the Harriman lines in Oregon, has issued a statement recounting the trouble of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen on the Atlantic system of the Southern Pacific, which may lead to a strike of the firemen to affect all the Harriman lines. The statement or communication was sent to all the firemen of the division under the jurisdiction of Manager O'Brien.

He declares that the question is an issue that ought to be settled by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, and that a strike by the members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen will work a decided hardship, not only to the railroad company, but to the public in general.

He quotes a statement sent to the firemen of Morgan's Louisiana & Texas & Steamship Company, Iberia & Vermilion Railroad, Louisiana & Western, Texas & New Orleans and the Galveston, Harrisburg & San Antonio. It cites that an agreement was entered into between the firemen and the associated lines interested April 1, 1905, and amended April 1, 1906, and with the engineers Feb. 1, 1903, and amended May 1, 1906, and that a difference has arisen between the two organizations as to which is authorized to deal with the management as to rates of pay, rules and regulations—in the latter case affecting seniority—and regarding engineers in switching service.

The statement which gives the side of the railroad company in the controversy, and which is signed by officials of the Atlantic system, in part is as follows:

"This is obviously a controversy directly affecting two organizations. The attitude of the management of these companies has been one of absolute neutrality, our position being that these companies have but an indirect interest in this controversy, that it is not of their nature to deal with the management as to rates of pay, rules and regulations—in the latter case affecting seniority—and regarding engineers in switching service. The statement which gives the side of the railroad company in the controversy, and which is signed by officials of the Atlantic system, in part is as follows:

"We have repeatedly urged in the conferences had with the committees of each organization that their differences should be settled amicably and fairly between themselves; that these companies have only an indirect interest in this controversy, and that neither was justified in insisting that these companies decide between them unless they were willing to abide by the decision thus made. These companies are willing to abide such settlement of the issue between the contending organizations as above defined as may be reached by them; or, in the alternative, we are willing to determine this issue if submitted to us, provided both organizations will agree to abide our decision.

It is deeply to be deplored that differences have arisen between the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, but we submit to the calm consideration of the members of the individual members that neither the public nor these companies should be compelled to suffer because of differences between two organizations which have but a remote and indirect interest in the issue involved in this controversy.

The issue involved in this controversy is purely a mooted question. These companies have absolutely no interest in the controversy between them. The question at issue is not involved in any unadjusted grievance between any of these companies and either engineer or fireman in their employ.

PERKINS DENIES CHARGES

Says No False Entries Made to Con-
ceal Stock Deals.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—George W. Perkins, formerly vice-president of the New York Life Insurance Company, today made a sworn denial of the charge that he had caused false entries to be made in the company's books to conceal the real nature of some of his stock transactions. The charges are made by the indictment for forgery in the third degree handed down against Mr. Perkins and Charles S. Fairchild, a week ago Friday. Mr. Perkins' answer was contained in a notice served by his counsel, Lewis L. Deland, on Assistant District Attorney Kresel, that he would appear before Judge Fitzgerald in the criminal branch of the Supreme Court next Thursday and move for permission to inspect the minutes of the grand jury which handed down the indictments.

PLOT OF REVOLUTIONISTS

Consul Refuses to Order Extradition
of Mexican Prisoners.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Jan. 5.—Finding the United States today refused to issue a warrant for the extradition of Jose Juan Arredondo and five Mexican companions, the defendants in the extradition proceedings instituted by the Mexican government, and the defendants were immediately rearrested by the immigration authorities to be tried on a charge of entering the United States in violation of the immigration laws.

BOARD FOR BANKER

Stranger Kills Himself and
Cashier Instantly.

TWO MORE DEATHS LIKELY

After Applying for Loan in Philadel-
phia, He Drops Missile, Causing
Swift Death and Panic—Ap-
parently Resident of Iowa.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 5.—Two men are dead, a score of others injured, two of whom may die, and a bank building is wrecked as the result of a bomb being dropped in the Fourth-street National Bank today by a man who had demanded a loan of \$5000 for which he could show no collateral. The identity of the perpetrator of the outrage is a mystery. He was blown to pieces by his own engine of death. The other man killed by the explosion was W. S. McLeary, cashier of the bank, who had been talking to the stranger and had refused his request.

A man answering the description of the bomb-thrower earlier in the day visited the Equitable Trust Company on Board street and demanded a loan of \$500 on security he declared to be in his possession. Receiving Teller McDevitt, whom he approached, ordered him to leave the building. He fumbled in his pocket, but finally withdrew. He stopped at the doorway, however, and again fumbled in his pockets. A woman patron of the Trust Company, passing at the time, is said, diverted the man's attention and, when the watchmen, following instructions of the teller, ordered him out, he reluctantly left the building. Shortly afterward news of the explosion at the Fourth-street bank reached the Trust Company.

The Injured.

Among the most seriously injured are: William Crump, colored, private messenger to the president of the bank, mangled and may die. William Wright, bank employee, may die. Thomas R. Rutter, Linsdale, Pa., fractured skull. Frank Labold, clerk. A. F. Dominick, clerk. C. R. Norton, clerk. Miss Julia Brady, stenographer.

Refused Money, Drops Bomb.

Eugene Melhorne, assistant to the cashier, returned to the bank building after having his wounds dressed at the Pennsylvania Hospital. He said: "I was about five feet from McLeary, as he was very busy at the time, as the bank was on the point of closing its doors after completion of the day's business. We were all getting ready to fix up our books. I noticed a man conversing with McLeary. He was talking in an excited manner. In one hand he carried a queer-shaped article wrapped in a newspaper. I said to a clerk: 'That fellow is a crank or he's crazy.' He cried: 'It's coming to me.' I didn't know what he meant. He said: 'Then you won't give it to me.' The man shouted. I saw Mr. McLeary shake his head and turn as if he was going to the door. The man then threw the thing in the newspaper on the floor right in front of Mr. McLeary and himself. It exploded.
