HOLD-UP STORY A FAKE—Planning to lay off some money to spend in pleasure-seeking, Charles Hunt, aged 15 years, son of John W. Hunt, of 672 Harold street, secured his weekly wages of \$3 in his father's home, then he invented a sensational hold-up and robbery story to "make good" with his parents. When the case was reported to the police, Captain of Detectives Brinn made an investigation and secured a full confession from the lad. Young Hunt works in the Southern Pacific car shops and it appears that he is pretty closely confined to his duties and to his home. He told the story at first that he was held up by a lone highwayman when returning to his home after working hours yesterday. He said every cent was taken from him. A gold watch, however, that was not taken by the alleged robber caused Captain Brinn to doubt the lad's story, and the considerable cross-questioning the confession was made.

MUSEUM OF ART OPEN TODAY—The Museum of Art will be open this (Sunday) afternoon from 2 to 4:30 with free admission. A loan exhibition of paintings from the collection of I. N. Fleischner, of this city, will then be opened. The exhibit of etchings is still in place on the second floor. In addition to the classes already meeting for work and study at the museum a new one is announced by the Art Students' League—a drawing class for children and beginners to meet on Saturday mornings. Miss Florence Marx, a pupil of P. V. Du Mond and of William Chase, of the New York School of Art, will be the instructor and will be at the museum after 10 Saturday morning, February 2, to give information and organize the class, which will begin work the following week.

ENTERTAINMENT AT WOODSTOCK—Under the auspices of the Woodstock Push Club and Women's Auxiliary, an entertainment was given Friday night in Woodstock Hall. Over 300 people were present. Mayor Leno was present and spoke, congratulating the citizens in their enterprise in maintaining and improving so effectively for neighborhood betterment. He also spoke of the beauty of the Woodstock district and predicted marked progress there under the inspiration of the Push Club and Auxiliary. Professor Steele, of Ivanhoe, also spoke.

WHEN FIRE WAS DISCOVERED in the Chambers of Commerce building at 10 o'clock Friday night, the fire started from refuse on the top floor. Janitor C. G. Carlson ran to the auxiliary box of the National Automatic Fire Alarm Company, of Oregon, on the ground floor, and pulled in a call that rang in box No. 141, situated at Third and Oak streets. Before he could run to the corner, 300 feet distant, the fire department was on the scene ready for action. The fire was quickly extinguished without loss.

REPEAL NOT FAVORED—A special meeting of the Oregon Forestry Association was held in the office of the Oregon Lumber Manufacturers Association in Portland Friday evening and attended by members of the Legislature who are interested in bills looking to the repeal of the present forest law. There is a strong sentiment among the big lumbermen for the repeal of the present law, while other members are in favor of amending the law so as to strike out that part of Section 5 requiring the people from June 1 to October 1 to obtain permits from the County Clerk's office to burn slashings or otherwise set out fires. The sentiment of the association was, however, that the present law has done much to prevent fires, and it was unanimously agreed that the Legislature should seek modification of the present law rather than its repeal.

DEATH OF MRS. MARGARET D. MCGARRY—Mrs. Margaret D. McGarry, wife of Attorney W. R. McGarry, died at her home, 21 East Second street North, Friday night of typhoid pneumonia after a short illness. She was 54 years of age. The funeral will be held tomorrow at 10 o'clock from the First Church, East Eleventh and Oak streets. Interment will be in Mount Calvary Cemetery.

REPAIRING ELEVATED ROADWAY—The city has a force of men repairing the elevated roadway on Grand avenue across Stephens' Slough. The substructure was in bad condition and many new timbers were required. Work will be started soon on East Oak street between Second and East Water streets. The East Eighth-street roadway across Stephens Slough is also being repaired and in such condition that the City Engineer may have to close it up before it can be reached. This is an important roadway, serving a big district toward the south. To close it up would work a hardship all around.
