ators and Representatives shall, at the ses-sion next following an enumeration of the inhabitance, by the United States or the state, be fixed by law, and apportioned

among the several counties, according to

the number of white population in each And the ratio of semators and Representa-tives shall be determined by dividing the whole number of white population of such

county or district by such respective ratio; nd, when a fraction shall result from such resion, which shall exceed one-half of such tio, such county or district shall be entitled to a member for such fraction. And in

care any county shall not have the requi-sife population to entitle such county to a member, these such county shall be attached to some adjoining county for Senatorial or Representative purposes.

touch only on the point of one corner; Benton and Linn constitute too large a population district for one Repre-sentative; and Claisop is entitled to two Representatives, rather than one.

It will be seen that the apportion-ment will not be easily made, and that there is wide range for opinion in the makeup of the districts.






