

SEEDS OF DISCORD IN APPORTIONMENT

Lawmakers Lining Up for Fight Over New Legislative Districts.

SEVERAL COUNTIES HURT

One Becomes May Be General Combination Against Multnomah Which Will Benefit Greatly Under Census-Division Plan.

Reads to date at the drop of the hat, over division of Oregon into new legislative districts, on the basis of the 1906 state census, the lawmakers at Salem already are grouping themselves in defensive and offensive alliances.

The whole population of Oregon in 1906 was 54,976 by state census. This means that one Senator will be allowed for every 15,162 white inhabitants and one Representative for every 7581.

The problem in the House will be simpler, because on account of the 69 members of that body, the joint districts are not so difficult to make as in the Senate.

Only one bill in reapportionment has thus far appeared—from Representative W. H. Miller, the Oregon bill which will not be accepted by counties, which it cuts down in representation, unless it shall be forced upon them.

Benton, which will lose its one Senator and be put into a joint district, probably with Lincoln and possibly also with Yamhill, the latter in a joint district.

Lincoln's population is 674, and the basis of representation will be one Senator for 65,162 population.

Four Counties to Paddy. These four counties, Benton, Polk, Marion and Yamhill, doubtless will be hard to pacify, yet they are confronted with the census and the Oregon constitution, which reads:

Article 4, section 6—The number of Senators and Representatives shall, at the session next following a reapportionment of the counties, be determined by dividing the whole number of white population of such county or district by such respective ratio:

But Two Will Gain. But two counties will gain in the new reapportionment of Senators—Baker and Multnomah—if the constitution shall be strictly adhered to, while the other counties named will stay practically as at present.

Acceptable to Multnomah. Representative Washburn's bill would allow 17 Representatives to Multnomah, and would therefore be acceptable to this county. But other counties would not consent to such a reapportionment.

Pinch Outside Counties. To allow Multnomah eight Senators or its own would pinch the outside counties. It is quite probable that before the reapportionment bill shall be passed, it will ally outside counties against Multnomah.

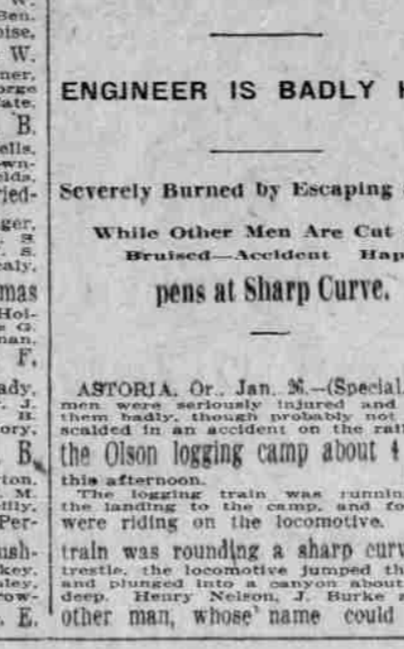
Logging Engine and Four Men Fall From Trestle.
