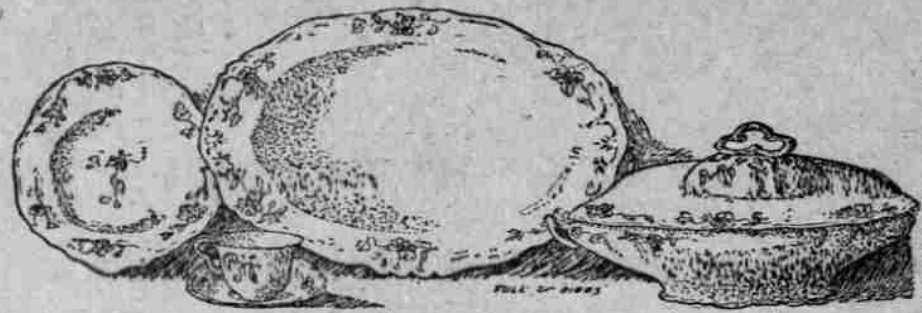

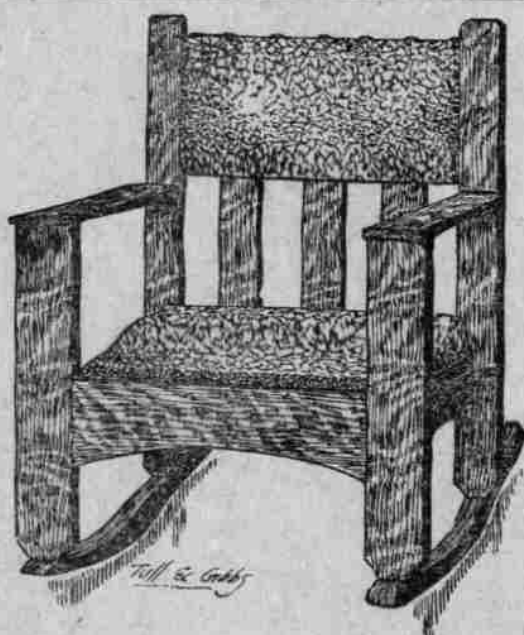

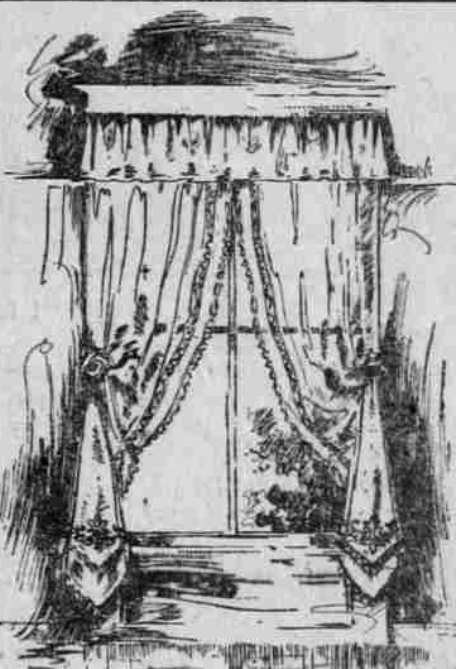

EXPORTS ARE FAIR

In Spite of River Blockade, Shipments are Heavy.

MUCH LUMBER GOES SOUTH

Only One Foreign Cargo of Timber for the Month—Exporters Experience Trouble in Securing Sufficient Quantity of Wheat.

In spite of the setback to shipping on account of the ice blockade in the Columbia, wheat and flour exports are close to the average. The same can be said of the coastwise lumber trade. Since the first of the month there has been only one cargo of lumber to clear foreign—that of the British steamship *Crusader*, which carried 3,300,000 feet to Calcutta, India. Since the beginning of the second half of the month, there has been cleared from the Custom-house in Portland 82,842 bushels of wheat, valued at \$57,173; 85,000 barrels of flour, valued at \$14,235.50. Not including the lumber shipped from points outside the City of Portland on the Willamette and Columbia Rivers, there has been dispatched to California ports 7,150,372 feet of lumber. Foreign shipments amounted to 3,340,000 feet, making the total lumber shipments run close to 35,500,000 feet.

During the four remaining days of the month, several ships will clear, and the total for the month of January, both in grain and lumber, will keep the average up to a fair standard. Had it not been for the difficulty experienced by exporters in securing wheat, the shipments for the month would have surpassed those of December to a large extent.

Car shortage and fuel famine have had a depressing effect on the local grain trade. For the past month receipts have been only 20 per cent of the average. Stocks and warehouses are now clear, and between 150 and 200 cars could be handled daily. As it is, only 10 to 15 cars are received. The lumber traffic was retarded to

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
