NEW BAND ORGANIZED.—J. R. Tomlinson, who was instrumental in organizing the Southern Pacific Band seven years ago, which disbanded about a year ago, has organized what will be known as the Tomlinson East Side Band. It is composed of 15 members, mainly those who were connected with the Southern Pacific Band, all of whom are engaged in business, but love music. This band is making an effort to secure a part of the concert money that is appropriated every year for public concerts given in the East Side parks, and already has secured the endorsement of several of the push clubs in this effort. It is set forth that the band is composed of young men, who are giving their time to music and are entitled to encouragement.

HARDWARE DEALERS' CONVENTION.—Oregon hardware men will meet at the Chamber of Commerce Wednesday and Thursday of this week. The organization is known as the State Hardware & Implement Dealers' Association, and a majority of the men engaged in this line of business in the state are identified with the association. Wednesday will be taken up with routine business, and on Thursday a number of papers dealing with subjects of interest to the trade will be taken up. On Thursday night a banquet will be given. H. J. Altrow, of Woodburn, is president of the organization, and will preside at the sessions. Several hundred dealers throughout the state will be in attendance.

NOTED EVANGELIST COMING.—Rev. G. R. Cairn, of Seattle, Will Conduct Revival Meetings.

Rev. George Robert Cairn, who is considered one of the most prominent and ablest Baptist evangelists and ministers, will begin a two-weeks' series of meetings at the Second Baptist Church, East Seventh and Ankeny streets, Monday.

The meetings will be held every evening at 7:30 o'clock. Also every afternoon at 3:30 the will give a Bible address, Sunday afternoon, February 17, Dr. Cairn has consented to address the business men of Portland at the Y. M. C. A.

Dr. Cairn was in Portland two years ago and held successful meetings. He is the pastor of the Temple Baptist Church of Seattle. Dr. Cairn started out as a singer of gospel songs at revival meetings held in England and in this country, and then entered the ministry. He has traveled all over the United States and England in his evangelistic trips. Up to the time he accepted the Seattle call he had held meetings in 25 states.

Another feature of the circuit which is to be presented at the Armory after Lent are beginning to assume huge proportions, and already great activity is being shown at the Multnomah Athletic Club and also by members of the Oregon National Guard in Portland, under whose auspices the show will be given.

All kinds of circus acts are in preparation, there being some 200 athletes who will be seen in the gymnastic and athletic division of the show, and several well known clubmen are getting up brother acts, sister acts and animal acts, and acts which are being built for laughing purposes only.

Lincoln Hart has been chosen general manager for the society circus. The side-shows and menagerie will also be features of the big show. It is planned to have a fine street parade in the afternoon on the opening date.

Another feature of the circuit which should prove attractive is a large spectacle and extravaganza, with French ballet and Spanish dancers interpolated.

Robert Krohn, who is in charge of the dancing and spectacular features, says that in all his experience he has never felt more sanguine for the success of a society circus, as the material at hand and the enthusiasm are greater than at any other time.
